#### 2011-2012 Academic Policies & Procedures Committee Meeting No. 1 MINUTES

#### 1. CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

A motion was made and seconded to call the August 25, 2011 AP&P Committee Meeting to order at 3:05 p.m. Ms. Maria Clinton, AP&P Faculty Co-Chair, called the meeting to order at 3:05 p.m. Motion carried.

#### 2. OPENING COMMENTS FROM THE COMMITTEE CO-CHAIR

#### a. Summer Update

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that most of her summer was spent identifying and correcting the issues in CurricUNET, which required the system to be brought down during those system upgrades. She also stated that she attended the Curriculum Institute where the Chancellor's Office communicated several changes coming our way for implementation next year. One of the items discussed in detail are the changes to the repeatability of course, which will be talked about later.

#### 3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

a. May 26, 2011

A motion was made and seconded to approve items 3a Approval of Minutes: May 26, 2011. Motion carried.

#### 4. MANDATORY CHANCELLORS OFFICE TRAINING

#### a. Stand-Alone Training

This is the fifth year of the mandatory stand-alone course training, which will allow us to approve these types of courses. Ms. Clinton presented a 28 slide PowerPoint presentation from the Chancellor's Office and discussed each slide as required along with the four mandatory handouts. Maria Clinton said that we are in compliance with Title 5 and all the requirements are already built into our forms. She will send the certification form up to the Chancellor's Office next week with all necessary original signatures.

#### 5. INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

### a. Technical Review Committee – Dr. Darcy Wiewall, Ms. Linda Harmon, Dr. Scott Lee, Ms. Nancy Cholvin

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that the above individuals have volunteered to review all CORs as technical reviewers. Dr. Uhazy stated that Ms. Cholvin recently sent an email requesting to drop off of AP&P and DEC. Ms. Clinton stated that we will need to look for a replacement DES Liaison and Math representative. Ms. Clinton reviewed the approval process bringing attention to the technical review step and the role of those who review at this step.

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that the handbook is not quite ready since she still needs to incorporate the changes to the program process and the use of CurricUNET. She stated that she will be revising it during the next few weeks and will distribute soon.

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#### c. 2011-12 Timeline/Meeting Dates

- Courses need to be approved by 12/8/2011 in order to be included in the 2012/13 College Catalog and class schedule

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that the dates of our upcoming meetings and deadlines associated with those meetings are posted to the above mentioned website. She also stressed the importance of receiving AP&P approval on all submitted material by December 8, 2011 so that it may be included in the next college catalog. In order to meet this deadline the material should be entered into CurricUNET no later than September 30, 2011. Any revisions approved in the spring semester may not be included in the catalog due to publication deadlines. Ms. Maria Clinton also stated that the courses listed below have the scheduling restrictions noted and has requested the committee to consider approving the revision of the courses in the sixth year instead of our current process of revising at year five. CurricUNET has speeded up our process and courses are moving through quicker than in the past. Mrs. Sharon Lowry stated that programs are required to be reviewed at year four and it really doesn't make sense to revise the program without revising the courses. Ms. De'Nean Coleman-Carew and Mrs. Margaret Drake stated that revising in year five allows the instructors a comfortable cushion just in case the course does not complete the process as quickly. Mrs. Margaret Drake also stated that review of the program at year four does not always trigger a revision to the courses at that time. Mrs. Sharon Lowry stated that the six year rule is a Title 5 requirement however this committee can decide to require our college to review earlier than six years, Title 5 only requires that we do not exceed the six year rule. Ms. Maria Clinton stated that we will continue to consider this change but we will not take any actions at this time.

#### d. CurricUNET - <u>www.curricunet.com/avc</u>

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that the program module is now up in CurricUNET and will be used to revise or create programs. She also stated that approval process for courses was cleaned up and requested that Ms. Melissa Jauregui bring up the courses module and display those changes. Ms. Melissa Jauregui stated that the approval process for Non-Substantial course revisions was revised to include the approval from the division dean and AP&P representative. This particular change required CurricUNET to be brought down so that the revisions did not adversely affect any courses being submitted. She also brought up the new program module, checklist for the programs and reviewed each item, along with the approval process for each type of revision or new program development.

Ms. Maria Clinton reiterated that the list of courses at the end of this agenda are required to be reviewed this year and must be entered and submitted in CurricUNET by the end of September to avoid scheduling restrictions in the 12-13 academic year. She requested the AP&P representatives review the list at each meeting to be sure that the courses are moving through the process.

#### f. SB 1440

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that there are additional links now on the AP&P Website for the faculty to review if developing new transfer degrees this year. She stated that we may want to bring a few more through this year while Mrs. Margaret Drake is with us since she is retiring next year. Ms. Melissa Jauregui brought up the list of approved transfer degrees on the Chancellor's Office Website for the committee's review. Ms. Maria Clinton stated that Studio Arts faculty have expressed interest in developing their degree this year, which will be brought through the new program module. She requested that Mrs. Margaret Drake assist in this process or at least be available to answer questions regarding the development of these degrees. Mrs. Margaret Drake indicated that she was not willing to fully participate in the development process this time around. Dr. Lee Grishman stated that a lot of discussion has taken place regarding the 18 unit cap on core course work for these degrees and therefore changes to the degree structure may be coming down. Additional discussion took place regarding this topic, Ms. Maria Clinton stated that changes will always occur but we may still want to move forward with the development of new degrees.

#### g. Credit by Exam List

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that the credit by exam list is attached to this packet for the committee member's review and distribution to their divisions. Any changes should be submitted to this committee in the format of a memo for consideration and approval.

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#### 6. CONTINUING AP&P 11-12 AGENDA ITEMS

#### a. Upper Division Course Units Procedures

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that Dr. Lee Grishman was going to develop the procedures for accepting upper division units and those will be brought to this committee.

#### b. IB Examinations

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that we needed to revisit this item this year in an effort to complete the discussion on this matter.

#### c. Mission Statement

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that we review the mission statement every year but last year some divisions wished to revise this existing statement. We will further discuss this in the spring.

d. Proficiency Requirements upon Graduation - Reading, Mathematics, and Writing Proficiency levels
Ms. Maria Clinton stated that our Reading Proficiency is a little problematic because students are able to
complete their entire degree but are not approved for graduation since they never took the assessment test. Dr.
Lee Grishman stated that we have now come full circle on this item since the reading faculty had come to this
committee to approve it this way. Mrs. Sharon Lowry stated that the State is revisiting this item and realizing
that fulfilling a proficiency requirement such as ours may not be the best way to complete this requirement.
Many institutions are looking at the possibility of other courses that may fulfill the reading proficiency
requirement. Additional discussion regarding this topic took place, at which Ms. Maria Clinton stated that this
item would return to the agenda with additional information for the committee to consider. Mrs. Sharon

Lowry added that we really need to look at this item in regards to its practicality rather than be driven by budgetary reasons.

#### e. Repeatable and Repeatability of courses

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that changes are coming down regarding these two issues so our committee will need to discuss and implement the changes. She stated that the current language of course repeatability states that it can only be applied if the course is part of a degree core. Dr. De'Nean Coleman-Carew stated that DM 101 currently has repeatability but it is no longer part of the degree core. Ms. Maria Clinton stated that the repeatability on DM 101 would need to be removed based on the new interpretation of this law. Mrs. Sharon Lowry stated that the changes to repeatable courses, those retaken due to substandard grades, needs to be implemented once the new law is passed and vetted since students can be denied credit if allowed to take the courses past the number allowed through this new law.

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#### 2011-2012 Academic Policies & Procedures Committee Meeting No. 2 MINUTES

#### 1. CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

A motion was made and seconded to call the September 8, 2011 AP&P Committee Meeting to order at 3:04 p.m. Ms. Maria Clinton, AP&P Faculty Co-Chair, called the meeting to order at 3:04 p.m. Motion carried.

#### 2. OPENING COMMENTS FROM THE COMMITTEE CO-CHAIR

#### 3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

a. August 25, 2011

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that the minutes will be sent out by email next week with a request for a motion of approval. Motion tabled.

#### 4. INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that just a reminder to have the faculty responsible for each course at the end of this agenda to enter the changes into CurricUNET. Be sure to report the list of courses to your division at division meetings.

#### 5. DISCUSSION ITEM

#### a. Program Learning Outcomes and AP&P approval of new/revised program

Ms. Maria Clinton requested that the committee consider requiring Program Learning Outcomes to be on file prior to our committees review of any changes to degrees or certificates. This is currently the practice when AP&P review course outline of record. If the course does not have established Student Learning Outcomes on file, then it is not placed on our agenda for consideration and approval. Since this is an accreditation issue, she feels we should implement the same requirements for programs. Mrs, Beverly Beyer asked whether we are asking faculty to enter the PLOs in CurricUNET. Ms. Clinton clarified that no we are simply verifying that approved PLOs are on file prior to a program revision or new development being placed on our agenda for review. Ms. Clinton stated that this item should be considered and it will be placed on the next agenda for approval.

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- b. Counselors request that AVC grant credit for IB courses consistent with what the CSU system accepts.
  - Does AVC offer the courses that would be equivalent to the IB exams? If so who will approach the discipline faculty to request the consideration of IB courses? Do all disciplines work on this at once or has a critical list of areas been established that AP&P can focus on now?

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that this item came to the committee from the Counseling office for review and consideration. She stated that we need to identify a method of getting this out to the faculty so they are able to review the exams and determine whether or not it is appropriate to grant students credit. Dr. Lee Grishman stated that these standardized tests need to be accepted by the college in order to benefit the students. He continued to state that the AP&P Committee needs to make the decision to accept these exams and faculty will have no choice but to give their students credit. He continued to state that we should establish criteria that is sufficient for these courses to be accepted and determine which courses meet that criteria, then it would be sent to the instructors to review. Mrs. Sharon Lowry stated that this is not something that can be taken out of the discipline faculty hands. Ms. Maria Clinton requested that the lists be brought up from the AP&P packet for the committee to review. Additional discussion took place regarding this issue at which Mrs. Sharon Lowry stated that this item has come to the committee back in 2006 she believes and the committee turned it down in totality. Dr. Les Uhazy stated that the Mathematics faculty have noticed that student who have taken the IB courses have taken our assessment test and scored below college level which indicated that the exams do not prepare mathematic students for college as it states. Ms. Maria Clinton asked if any other disciplines have noticed this same occurrence with students who have taken IB in high school. She also requested that the an IB list similar to the CLEP and AP list in the catalog be created to include the AVC course that best aligns with each exam through the addition of a new column. Dr. De'Nean Coleman-Carew volunteered to put this packet together for the AP&P committee so it may be disseminated to the discipline faculty for review and approval.

- c. Counselors request that AVC grant the same number of units for AP courses as the CSU. By adopting this policy, the unit worth of the classes will not change when a student transfers from AVC to a CSU.
  - Please identify the courses that are problematic on our list. Since page 45 of the catalog is reviewed and revised by Counseling and Matriculation, please make necessary changes to this list and send to AP&P for discussion and/or approval.

Dr. De'Nean Coleman-Carew stated that this came up because the CSU accepts different unit values for the AP and CLEP exams. Dr. Lee Grishman stated that this will always occur since each CSU has the ability to set the acceptable unit value at different amounts. Ms. Maria Clinton stated that we will strike this item then. Dr. De'Nean Coleman-Carew stated that she will review her notes again on this topic and bring it back to the committee if necessary.

- d. Counselors request that an additional means of meeting the Reading Proficiency Requirement for Graduation from AVC be added That being completion of an Associate Degree or higher from a Regionally Accredited College or University.

Ms. Maria Clinton stated that the reading requirement proficiency has deterred several students in the completion of their degree. She requested that each of the noted college catalogs be brought up for our consideration in revising our reading proficiency requirement. Ms. LaDonna Trimble stated that students who have completed all degree requirements are being told to take the reading assessment and 100% of those students pass the exam. As a result, we need to determine if this is economically appropriate to be requiring this exam for those students who already have a degree but have returned to school to get a second associate degree. Ms. Jeffrie Ahmad asked whether the reading faculty were aware that AP&P was looking at the reading proficiency. Ms. Clinton stated that the reading faculty were invited to attend and are aware that we are evaluating this graduation requirement. Mrs. Maggie Drake stated that this is clearly a road block for successful students and in order to assist those students we need to take down the road blocks. She asked whether or not we could gather data that compares student cut scores on the assessment to success in English 101. Mrs. Sharon Lowry stated that we need to be sure to look at ENGL 101 and evaluate the proficiency level stated on the course. Currently the course carries an advisory of "Eligibility of READ 099," which we need to make sure this is revised if this course will meet the college level reading proficiency requirement. We may also wish to revise ENGL 101 to include a reading requirement so to allow this one course to meeting the reading and writing proficiency requirements. Ms. Maria Clinton stated that she would get with the research department to gather the data necessary to assist us in making this decision. This will return to the next agenda for evaluation of the data.

# PETITION FOR CREDIT BY EXAMINATION INFORMATION, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS

#### INFORMATION:

A currently enrolled student may challenge certain courses offered by the College for any of the following purposes:

- Satisfying prerequisites.
- Meeting graduation unit requirements.
- Obtaining course credit for equivalent experience or competency.

Students MAY NOT be registered for the course being challenged.

Students may be permitted to obtain credit by examination in selected subjects designated by a division in which the course is taught. A fee is charged for each examination. Students must be qualified to challenge a course by examination through satisfaction of prerequisites for the course or previous experience or training. The grade and credits received after satisfactory completion of examinations will be entered on the student's permanent record. The student's academic record shall be clearly annotated to reflect that the credit was earned by examination.

The results of the examination will be entered on the student's record. At the time a request is submitted, students must indicate whether they wish a letter grade, or a grade of "Pass/No Pass" (if allowed).

One year must elapse before a request for re-examination will be considered.

#### CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS:

- 1. Students must be currently enrolled at AVC.
- 2. Students must submit challenge forms within the first four weeks of the semester.
- 3. Students challenging a course must complete the examination by Friday of the seventh week of the semester.
- 4. Students may challenge a maximum of four courses during their enrollment at AVC.
- 5. Challenge forms are available only in the fall and spring semesters. Summer forms are available only with the written permission of the instructor.
- 6. The units received by examination may not be used to satisfy the college's residency requirements.
- 7. Credit received is not applicable for financial aid, veteran's pay, or athletic eligibility.

# PETITION FOR CREDIT BY EXAMINATION REQUEST PROCEDURE

#### PROCEDURE:

- 1. Students requesting credit by examination must be currently registered at AVC and actively participating in course (s). Students MAY NOT be enrolled in the course they are challenging.
- 2. A student wishing to challenge a course must submit the completed Petition for Credit by Examination form to Admission and Records within the first four weeks of the semester. The form shall indicate if the course is to be challenged for grade or "Pass/No Pass".
- 3. Students whose form has been approved by Admissions & Records will be required to pay the current per-unit enrollment fee to the Cashier's Office.
- 4. The student then submits the form to the appropriate Division Dean and instructor for approval. It is the student's responsibility to make the necessary arrangements with the instructor.
- 5. The student should request a copy of the completed Petition for Credit by Examination form from the Division.
- 6. The form is forwarded to Admissions & Records by the Division Office with the final grade.
- 7. The grade will be posted to the record at the end of the semester.
- 8. The student is notified that a change has been made to their academic record by email.

### BP 4020 Program, Curriculum, and Course Development

#### Reference:

Education Code Section 70901(b), 70902(b); 78016, Title 5, Section 51000, 51022, 55100, 55130, 55150 U.S. Department of Education regulations on the Integrity of Federal Student Financial Aid Programs under Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended.

The programs and curricula of the District shall be of high quality, relevant to community and student needs, and evaluated regularly to ensure quality and currency. To that end, the Academic Senate shall establish procedures for the development and review of all curricular offerings, including their establishment, modification or discontinuance.

Program and curriculum development includes, but is not limited to, procedures for new, revised, or deleted courses and programs, the establishment of prerequisites, advisories, and limitations on enrollment, and procedures for changes in course number, title, units, repeatability, maximum class size, or hours. As specified in BP 2510, the Board of Trustees agrees to "rely primarily" on the Academic Senate in matters pertaining to Academic and Professional Matters, (1) Curriculum, including establishing prerequisites and (4) Education program development.

All new courses and programs, including program deletions, shall be approved by the Board.

All new programs shall be submitted to the Office of the Chancellor for the California Community Colleges for approval as required.

Individual degree-applicable credit courses offered as part of a permitted educational program shall be approved by the Board. Nondegree-applicable credit and degree-applicable credit courses that are not part of an existing approved program must satisfy the conditions authorized by Title 5 regulations and shall be approved by the Board.

#### **Credit Hour**

Consistent with federal regulations applicable to federal financial aid eligibility, the District shall assess and designate each of its programs as either a "credit hour" program or a "clock hour" program.

The [CEO] will establish procedures which prescribe the definition of "credit hour" consistent with applicable federal regulations, as they apply to community college districts.

The [ CEO ] shall establish procedures to assure that curriculum at the District complies with the definition of "credit hour" or "clock hour," where applicable. The [ CEO ] shall also establish procedure for using a clock-to-credit hour conversion formula to determine whether a credit hour program is eligible for federal financial aid. The conversion formula is used to determine whether such a credit-hour program has an appropriate minimum number of clock hours of instruction for each credit hour it claims.

Procedures for course and program development, review, approval, and evaluation processes; designated responsibility and authority for development, review, and approval of courses; time lines for the process, required forms, and publication of curriculum changes; and the criteria and standards for all program and curriculum development can be found in the Academic Policies and Procedures Committee "Standards & Practice Handbook," available on the AVC Intranet.

Note: This procedure is legally required in an effort to show good faith compliance with the applicable federal regulations

For purposes of federal financial aid eligibility, a "credit hour" shall be not less than:

One hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out of class student work each week for

- approximately [15 weeks for one semester or trimester hour of credit], [or 10 to 12 weeks for one quarter hour of credit], or the equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time; or
- At least an equivalent amount of work as required in the paragraph above, of this definition for other academic activities as established by the institution including laboratory work, internships, practica, studio work, and other academic work leading to the award of credit hours.

Need to add language stating that students may petition to have noncredit courses counted toward the satisfaction of requirements for an associate degree because Title 5 Section 55064 was recently amended to more clearly define the circumstances that allow a student to petition to have a noncredit course counted toward the associate degree. It also defines how much noncredit instruction must be provided for each unit of credit to be granted and that the instructor must meet the minimum qualifications for teaching the equivalent credit course. Lastly, the modifications state that the college must record the course, the student's grade, and collect payment from the student for the enrollment fees and non-resident tuition if applicable.

# AP 4100 Graduation Requirements for Degrees and Certificates

Reference:

Title 5, Sections 55070, 55800 55060 et seq.

#### Associate Degree Requirements

(Title 5, Section 55806)

Graduation from Antelope Valley College with the associate in arts or associate in science degree requires that students demonstrate competency in reading, writing, and mathematics and complete a minimum of 60 semester units, including requirements 1 through 6 listed below.

#### 1. General Education Requirements

A minimum of 21 units, including a minimum of 3 semester units, or 4 quarter units, in Areas A, B, C, D1, D2, E and F. Courses meeting general education and major requirements can be found in the Graduation/Associate Degree Requirements section of the college catalog.

Area A\* - Natural Sciences (Select at least 3 semester units)

Courses in the Natural Sciences are those which examine the physical universe, its life forms and its natural phenomena. To satisfy the GE requirement in natural sciences, a course shall be designed to help the student develop an appreciation and understanding of the scientific method, and encourage the understanding of the relationships between science and other human activities.

Area B\* -Social & Behavioral Sciences (Select at least 3 semester units)

Courses in the Social and Behavioral Sciences are those which focus on people as members of society. To satisfy the GE requirement in social and behavioral sciences, a course shall be designed to develop an awareness of the method of inquiry used by the social and behavioral sciences. It shall be designed to stimulate critical thinking about the ways people

act and have acted in response to their societies and should promote appreciation of how societies and social subgroups operate.

Area C\* - Humanities (Select at least 3 semester units)

Courses in the Humanities are those which study the cultural activities and artistic expression of human beings. To satisfy the GE requirement in the humanities, a course shall be designed to help the student develop an awareness of the ways in which people throughout the ages and in different cultures have responded to themselves and the world around them in artistic and cultural creation and help the student develop aesthetic understanding and an ability to make value judgments.

Area D -Language & Rationality [Select 3 semester units from (1) and select 3 units from (2)]

Courses in Language and Rationality are those which develop for the student the principles and applications of language toward logical thought, clear and precise expression and critical evaluation of communication in whatever symbol system the student uses.

#### 1. English Composition

Courses fulfilling the written composition requirement shall be designed to include both expository and argumentative writing.

2. Communication and Analytical Thinking

Courses fulfilling the communication and analytical thinking requirement include oral communication, mathematics, logic, statistics, computer languages and programming, and related disciplines.

Area E -Additional Breadth (Select at least 3 semester units)

Courses in this area are designed to expand the acquisition and utilization of knowledge in GE and/or self under-standing. Courses must be taken from a discipline not previously selected.

Area F - Diversity Studies (Select at least 3 semester units)

The primary focus of courses meeting the Diversity Studies requirement will deal, in depth, with non-dominant groups in the State of California and the United States. These groups of people are defined as African-American, Hispanic, Asian-Pacific Islander, Native American and Women. Courses meeting the Diversity Studies requirement will deal with more than one group. Courses will deal with one non-dominant group in comparison to the dominant group or other non-dominant group(s). Issues of racism and sexism will be explicitly covered.

#### 2. Proficiency Requirements

Proficiency requirements exist for the areas of Reading, Writing and Math. Students must demonstrate competency in each of these areas in order to be eligible for the associate degree.

- A. READING Completion of ENGL 101 with a minimum grade of "C."
- B. WRITING Completion of ENGL 101 with a minimum grade of "C."
- C. MATHEMATICS Completion of MATH 102 or higher or CIS 121 with a minimum grade of "C."
- 3. Major or Area of Emphasis Requirements

Major or area of emphasis requirements may be satisfied by:



A. Completing at least 18 semester units of study (or 27 quarter units) in a specific major or area of emphasis as outlined in the specific degree requirements listed in the AVC catalog, with a grade of "C" or better in all required core course and the specific courses listed as program electives.

#### 4. Electives

Sixty semester units are required for an associate degree. In addition to the general education and major requirements, the remaining number of semester units needed to complete an associate degree is considered electives. Any course that has already been counted toward (1) the general education requirements, or (2) the major or area of emphasis, cannot be used as an elective.

#### 5. Grade Point Average Requirement

A cumulative grade point average of 2.0 ("C" average) is required.

#### 6. Residence Requirement

Of the required 60 units, "at least 12 semester units must be completed in residence at the college granting the degree" as stated in Title 5, Section 55806.

Requirements for Two or More Associate Degrees

To be eligible for multiple associate degrees, a student must have completed all of the graduation requirements for each degree.

Antelope Valley College awards the associate arts and associate science degree to students who pursue majors or designated areas of emphasis listed in the college catalog. In the course description section of this catalog, all courses that apply to the associate degree or certificates are designated as (AVC).

The completion of an associate in arts or an associate in science degree does not ensure that a student can transfer directly to a four-year college or university. Students interested in transferring should refer to the Transfer Requirements section in the college catalog.

#### Certificate of Achievement Requirements:

- For a certificate of achievement, a student must successfully complete a course of study or curriculum that consists of 18 or more semester units or 27 or more quarter units of degree-applicable credit coursework. The certificate of achievement shall be designed to demonstrate that the student has completed coursework and developed capabilities relating to career or general education.
- A student may also be awarded a certificate of achievement for a sequence of courses consisting of 12 or more semester units or 18 or more quarter units if approved by the CCC Chancellor.



- Shorter credit programs that lead to a certificate may be established by the District, but cannot be listed on the student's transcript.
- Content and assessment standards for certificates shall ensure that certificate programs are consistent with the mission of Antelope Valley College, meet a demonstrated need, are feasible, and adhere to guidelines on academic integrity.



 Certificates for which CCC Chancellor's approval is not sought may be given any name or designation deemed appropriate except for certificate of achievement, certificate of completion, or certificate of competency.

#### Application for Graduation

Antelope Valley College awards degrees twice annually—in December following the fall semester and in June following the spring semester. An application for graduation must be filed in the Admissions and Records Office. After submitting the application, students will receive a formal evaluation of progress toward the degree. Students will receive information on participating in the annual graduation ceremony. While participation in the graduation ceremony is encouraged, it is not mandatory to attend to receive a degree. Early filing of the graduation application is highly recommended.

# Credit Courses Not Transferable/Applicable to the Associate Degree and Certificate Programs

Effective Fall 1988, selected credit courses shall not apply to the associate degree and certificate programs.

Students who enroll in credit courses not applicable to the degree can use these credits for eligibility purposes, i.e., full-time status, intercollegiate athletic status and financial aid status. In the course description section of the college catalog, these courses are designated as: Credit course not applicable to the associate degree and certificate programs. Grades will not count in calculating the GPA when received in credit courses not applicable to the associate degree and certificate programs. All courses that do apply to the associate degree or certificates are designated as (AVC).

The list of credit courses not applicable to the associate degree and certificate programs are listed in the college catalog under "Graduation/Associate Degree Requirements, Credit Courses Not Applicable to the Associate Degree and Certificate Programs

Note: Courses which emphasize occupational competency do not meet General Education (GE) objectives; and, no course may be counted as meeting both a GE requirement and a major requirement in any District degree.

### College Work Applicable to the Associate Degree and Certificate Programs

College work acceptable toward the associate degree includes those courses that have been properly approved pursuant to Title 5, Section 55002(a), or, if completed at other than a California community college, would reasonably be expected to meet the standards of that section
