## YEAR IN REVIEW 2010 | 2011

Anyone who's undergone intense scrutiny from an inquisitive yet well-meaning relative can appreciate what it's like for a college to undergo an accreditation site visit by a panel of professional colleagues.

College accreditation is a big deal. Yet it seems little understood by those outside of education.

Accreditation is an ongoing process whereby colleges document their effectiveness according to established standards. AVC's institution-wide accreditation is through the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC), which reports to the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). Then, there are other accrediting agencies for specific areas within the college such as nursing and radiologic technology.

However, there are some colleges that lack general accreditation or lack accreditation within specific academic areas. Lack of appropriate accreditation can be problematic for students as they try to move on in their academic pursuits or professional careers.

In recent years, the angst over accreditation has increased among colleges in the western region as more strict guidelines have been applied, resulting in a dramatic increase in the number of colleges being placed on warning or on probation. In the first half of 2011, there were 22 colleges on warning or on probation in our region.

Fall 2010 marked one of those times for AVC in a six-year cycle for a site visit by an accreditation team. I'm pleased to announce that we passed. Our accreditation was reaffirmed for another six years.

It's a tribute to the hard work done by our faculty, staff and administration. It assures our students that the education they receive at Antelope Valley College meets the quality standards for accreditation.

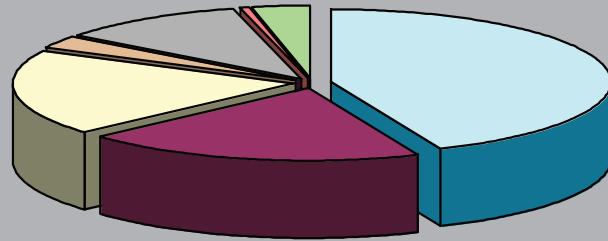

## SCHOLAR SHARES HIS ENTHUSIASM FOR HISTORY

If Dr. Matthew Jaffe had been born in an earlier time, he likely would have been the master storyteller providing tales of old to an attentive audience gathered around a campfire.

In the modern era, Jaffe uses his skills to bring the past to life as a history professor and Antelope Valley College's newest Scholar in Residence—an honor bestowed on one faculty member annually by other instructors.

"I'm joining a very good group," Jaffe said of the Scholar in Residence selection. Recipients are recognized for their compassion, skill in opening insights for students, dedication to innovation and excellence, and other criteria.

For a guy who is more interested in going about his business than collecting accolades, Jaffe admits to being "rather overwhelmed by the whole thing."

The road to history scholar began when Jaffe was in elementary school.

"My mother has saved a little exercise paper from when I was in the second grade that proves that I wanted to be a history teacher from the age of seven," he said.

"History was always fascinating. It answers one of the basic questions: Who are we? What are we doing here? ...not in a philosophical or a religious sense, but in terms of what human beings have accomplished," he said.

He attended the University of California, Los Angeles where he earned his bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees. His doctoral dissertation focused on the history of the ancient Babylonians. His studies included visits to European museums where he was able to access documentation.

He described the documents as something akin to going behind a modern grocery store to look at receipts, grocery lists and such in an effort to learn more about the people of the time.

Jaffe explained that trying to uncover information about ancient cultures is a challenge. For instance, a face on a coin or a statue may be the only indication of what people looked like at the time.

Jaffe, a native of Iowa who spent most of his life in Southern California, came to AVC in 1990 and quickly gained a reputation as an instructor who enjoyed history and related well to students.

## STUDENT TURNS TO AVC FOR CAREER MAKEOVER

As an editor for a publishing company, Laura Barron was finding her job to be increasingly tedious.

Then a neighbor expressed interest in enrolling in the respiratory care program at Antelope Valley College. That provided the impetus for Laura to return to school to become a registered nurse (RN).

“I decided I would do something I would be happier at,” Laura recalled. “With a computer information science and math background, I didn’t see myself doing something in the science field. But the opportunity was here to do that.

The move meant Laura had to come out of her comfort zone to enter a world she had not been a

part of for 16 years. It felt like a long time for the computer science major who had not completed her college degree program. It was 2006 and Laura—married with three children—was faced with the reality of having to start “from the very beginning.”

She enrolled in English 101, “Freshman Composition.”

“My first class was with William Vaughn. He made me feel so welcomed,” she said.

From there, she enrolled in other classes, including science courses that would provide the foundation for her entry to the associate degree nursing program in 2009.

Jaffe recognizes that few students in his classes aspire to be history majors, so he tries to convey his passion for the subject.

“I simply try to share the enthusiasm that I myself have. I play down dates ... and talk more about concepts and people. I’m a storyteller,” he said.

History provides a look at the extremes of human behavior—from their grandeur to terrible atrocities – and everything in between, according to Jaffe.

Like so many instructors, Jaffe has gratifying moments when students see the value in history:

whether it’s knowing the answer to a question on Jeopardy!, reading a book with a historical reference, or visiting a historical sight.

“(My goal is) that people leave the class knowing a little bit more about history. If that’s the case, then I think I’ve done my job.”

His colleagues aren’t the only ones to recognize his efforts. In 2005, the Associated Student Organization chose him as the inaugural recipient of its Most Inspirational Award.

When Jaffe isn’t in the classroom or his office, he can be found at any number of activities on

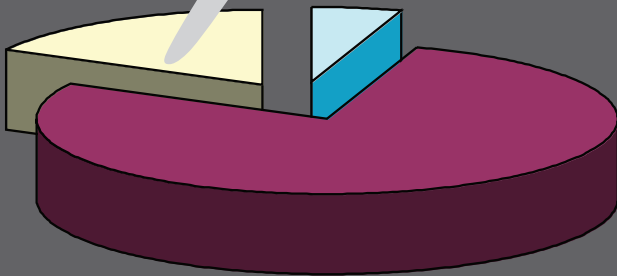
campus, including sporting events or student performances.

“The college is really my life,” he said. “The college really is my family.”

For any future historians seeking a perspective on Jaffe’s legacy at AVC, they need only look as far as the commemorative bench he purchased, located near the classroom he uses. The bench contains a bronze plaque bearing his name and the motto he lives by: “AVC Students First.”

For Laura, the nursing program was more than just textbooks, lectures and labs.

“I took a linear approach to try and do all these different things in the nursing program,” Laura said. “With any education there are so many opportunities. You have to step out of your boundaries and try.”

Laura had many questions her first semester in the program. She realized there was not a lot of communication between the different classes, so she helped start a local chapter of the National Student Nurses Association (NSNA) to improve communication among all the nursing students.

She created a blog, both to help herself and others. “If you have to write what you’re learning, you learn it better,” she said. She posted notes, flash cards and tips.

Laura’s leadership skills soon became apparent.

“She insisted on being co-president (of NSNA) in order to mentor the student president who would be taking over once Laura graduated,” said nursing Professor Marianne Stewart. “Having such a chapter on campus puts our students in a position to see themselves as professionals through exposure to those in leadership positions in nursing nationally.”

At a student nursing convention, Laura introduced herself to the dean of the nursing school at the University of California, Los Angeles. During a photo opportunity with the dean, Dr. Courtney Lyder, Laura asked him to speak at AVC’s pinning ceremony. Lyder accepted and spoke at the June 2011 pinning ceremony for Laura’s graduating class.

Also, she participated in RN lobby days at the state Capitol.

“Laura continually challenges herself to accept new and higher goals. She believes that she can accomplish whatever she puts her mind to. That is why she has done so much,” said Stewart.

Laura’s work has brought her many accolades.

The college Associated Student Organization presented her its Most Motivational Award. Her fellow nursing students named her Most Organized in Nursing and Most Likely to Get a Nursing PhD. The American Journal of Nursing recognized her blog with its top blog award. She earned a Perfect Attendance Award in the RN program. She has permanent membership in the community college honors society, Alpha Gamma Sigma. She was awarded the RN Alumni Scholarship.

In addition to her blog, Laura has published articles in the North American Nursing Diagnosis Association – International (NANDA-I) and the California Nursing Students’ Association. An essay she wrote on patient safety was one of only two winning entries from the United States in a NANDA-I competition.

During her time at AVC, she earned two degrees: an Associate in Science degree in nursing and an Associate in Arts degree.

“It was really good,” Laura said of her time at AVC. “The teachers are excellent. They are available. They are very knowledgeable about the clinical experience.”

Proof of that came this past summer when Laura passed the national licensing exam to become a registered nurse.

As she was going through the exam, she found herself thinking: “I know this because they taught it to me, I know this because they taught it to me ...”

“We are very proud of her ... for all of her accomplishments. One characteristic that I particularly notice about Laura is that she listens to others and works to bring about consensus. This ability will serve her well as a leader.”

## DESIRE TO OPEN OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOUNG PEOPLE YIELDS \$100,000 GIFT TO AVC

Hernando and Fran Marroquin appreciate the opportunities provided to students through athletics.

Fran saw many cases of successful student athletes in her former capacity as a community college counselor at East Los Angeles College.

“I saw miracles happen at that school—kids who were given the opportunity,” she said. That was several years ago, before Fran and Hernando embarked into the business world as owners of local McDonald’s restaurant franchises.

As the couple became more involved in the life of the Antelope Valley, they were drawn to Antelope Valley College where they provided support for Marauder Athletics, including sponsorship of football bowl games and basketball tournaments.

Last year, the Marroquins took another step in their ongoing support of student athletes with a \$100,000 donation to the Antelope Valley College Foundation.

“Education is what we have always tried to support. We wanted this to go directly to support student athletes and the programs that serve them,” said Fran Marroquin.

She explained that intercollegiate athletic programs provide opportunities for young people by engaging them in sports they enjoy while getting an education that can serve them a lifetime.

“We’re very fortunate to have people like Hernando and Fran who think enough of Marauder athletics to invest in the future of our student athletes,” said Newton Chelette, athletic director and dean of the physical education division. “The years I’ve been here, they’ve both been involved in our athletic department in many, many ways. This is just another generous contribution by them.”

“This is a great example of the support in the community for our student athletes,” said President Dr. Jackie L. Fisher Sr.

“Hernando and Fran have been long-time supporters of education at Antelope Valley College,” said Bridget Razo, executive director of the Antelope Valley College Foundation. “Their commitment and dedication to our students is unsurpassed. Their endowment will be great legacy and testament to the family’s commitment to education both now and for generations to come.”

At the suggestion of the Marroquins, the college’s stadium was named in honor of the school’s retired football coach, Brent Carder Marauder Stadium, in 2010.

The family’s ties to AVC extend to their two children, both of whom attended AVC before going on to graduate from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA).

Their gift will form an endowment that will be used to support AVC student athletes in perpetuity.

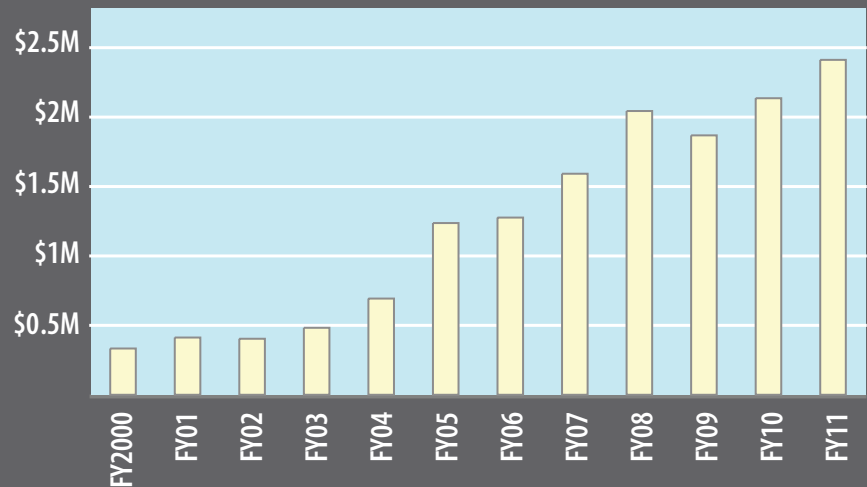

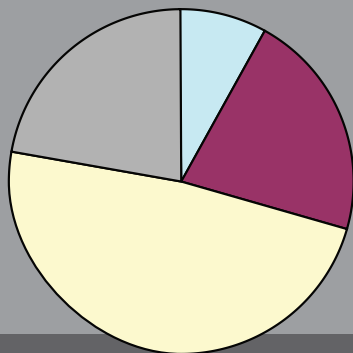

### AVC FOUNDATION TOTAL ASSETS



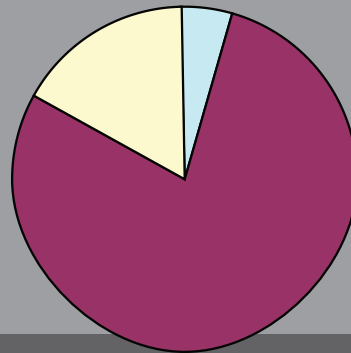
### AVC FOUNDATION REVENUE

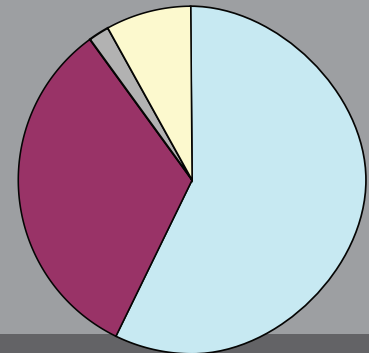
### SOURCE OF PRIVATE FUNDS

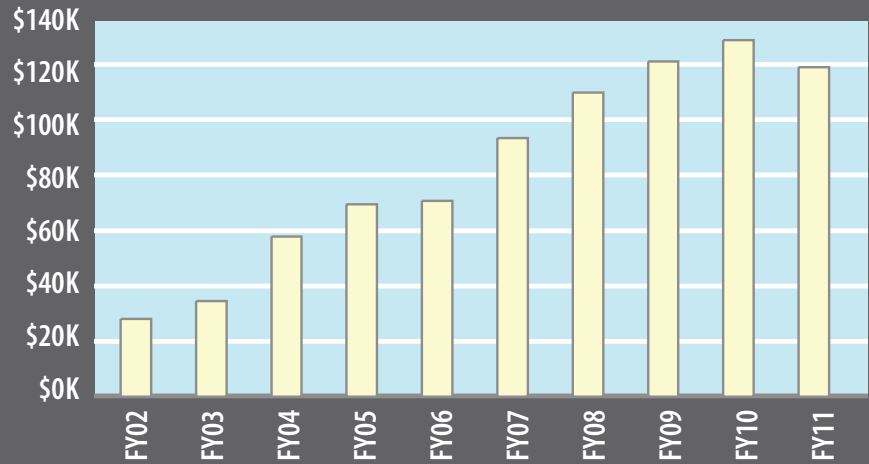

## TRANSFORMATIONAL GIFT HONORS CARTER FAMILY

A man who contributed to the development of local student athletes for decades has been immortalized through a gift to the Antelope Valley College Foundation and subsequent naming opportunity.

The field at Brent Carder Marauder Stadium will be known as Whit Carter Field following a gift announced made by the James A. and Annette M. Carter Charitable Remainder Trust in early 2011. The gift could be close to half a million dollars by the time it is delivered to the foundation after the death of the last surviving beneficiary, according to foundation Executive Director Bridget Razo.

The gift will be divided into thirds, with portions going to the McCutcheon Era Scholarship Endowment—named for an AVC football coach from the 1950s, the Whit Carter Hall of Fame, and all Marauder athletic programs through the Marauder Athletics Endowment.

“It’s really super what’s going on (at AVC) and the little bit I’m contributing to it is really well deserved,” said Jim Carter in discussing the gift and the contributions of his father, Whit Carter.

Soon after moving to the Antelope Valley from Wisconsin in the early 1920s, Whit Carter was engaged in a series of successful business ventures, ranging from The Red and White Stores grocery business of the 1920s to a radio station and bus company. In addition to his

business interests, Whit Carter was a sports enthusiast who carried his passion for football and basketball to coaching high school and elementary students. He also supported a semi-pro basketball team, the Lancaster Merchants.

Among those Whit Carter coached was young Jim Carter when Jim was enrolled at Lancaster Grammar School.

During World War II, Whit Carter supported Antelope Valley High School students by transporting them to athletic contests.

In the late 1940s, the elder Carter formed Antelope Valley Broadcasting and launched radio station KAVL, which offered music, news and local sports broadcasts—including Antelope Valley College games—to local listeners. He also served as the public address announcer for high school and college games.

In the 1950s, Whit Carter took over ownership of the local bus company and formed Antelope Valley Bus Inc., which became one of the largest privately owned bus companies in California, eventually being acquired by Coach USA in 1997.

Jim Carter was named vice president and general manager of the bus company in 1958. He was named president in 1978.

Before going into business, Jim Carter attended AVC where he played on the football team prior to his graduation in 1955. He looks back on his time at AVC with fond memories.

“There were a lot of people who went to that college who became very successful in life. It really makes me feel good to look at all the success of my teammates.”
