Communication Studies, AA-T – Thomas Graves
 Mr. Graves reported that the PLOs are completed and approved, but the plan of study has not been submitted yet. A motion was made and seconded to approve pending submittal of the plan of study by Friday, December 7, 2012. Motion carried with no objections or abstentions.

## 8. ACTION ITEM: FIRST READING – Substantial Course Revision

- a. CHIN 101, Elementary Chinese 1 5 hours lec weekly, 5 units Andrew Miller reported that he has revised the objectives to make them more in line with the proficiency, and also changed the textbooks to be more appropriate for a college level course.
- b. CHIN 102, Elementary Chinese 2 Same as CHIN 101. A motion was made and seconded to approve Chinese 101 and 102. Motion carried.
- c. CHIN 201, Intermediate Chinese
- d. CHIN 202, Intermediate Chinese

Mr. Miller explained that Chinese 201 and 202 are no longer on the books, but he was asked to recreate them so they can be offered when funding improves. He is asking for the class size to be reduced from 35 to 30. The committee felt that class size for second level foreign languages should be consistent. A motion was made and seconded to approve CHIN 201 and 202 with a maximum class size of 35. Motion carried.

- ENGR 120, Introduction to 2-D CAD
   Dr. Richard Colgren reported that he had removed the pre-requisite and also changed the title. A motion was made and seconded to approve ENGR 120. Motion carried.
- ENGR 185, Digital Logic and Design
   Dr. Colgren reported that he had changed the units on this class. A motion was made and seconded to approve ENGR 185. Motion carried.
- g. KIN 230, Intercollegiate Women's Soccer Cindy Littlefield reported that there was a change in terminology and also updated the textbook. She explained that this is an intercollegiate course and there is no homework. A motion was made and seconded to approve KIN 230. Motion carried.
- LAC 100, Introduction to Tutoring Diane Flores-Kagan explained that a note was added that if the student completes the course with an A or B, has a 3.0 GPA, and accumulates 25 hours of supervised tutoring experience, they may be certified through the professional tutoring association. A motion was made and seconded to approve LAC 100. Motion carried.
- i. Hybrid LAC 100, Introduction to Tutoring

Ms. Flores-Kagan explained that, although this is an online course, all presentations and role plays will take place in a face-to-face setting. A motion was made and seconded to approve LAC 100 hybrid. Motion carried.

LAC 200, Advanced Tutoring j.

> Ms. Flores-Kagan explained that a note was added that if the student completes the course with an A or B, has a 3.0 GPA, and accumulates 25 hours of supervised tutoring experience, they may be certified through the professional tutoring association. A motion was made and seconded to approve LAC 200. Motion carried.

- k. MUSC 225, Commercial Music Ensemble Dr. Berkeley Price reported that this course was converted to a lab to maintain repeatability. A motion was made and seconded to approve MUSC 225. Motion carried.
- THA 120A, Rehearsal and Performance: Drama 1. Eugenie Trow and Jonet Leighton reported that the class maximum has been increased from 25 to 50 to accommodate the size of the cast. A motion was made and seconded to approve THA 120A. Motion carried.
- m. THA 120B, Rehearsal and Performance: Comedy Ms. Trow and Leighton reported that the hours and units had been adjusted to maintain repeatability. A motion was made and seconded to approve THA 120B. Motion carried.
- THA 120C, Rehearsal and Performance: Musical Theatre n. Ms. Trow and Ms. Leighton reported that the units and hours had been adjusted to maintain repeatability. . A motion was made and seconded to approve THA 120C. Motion carried.
- o. THA 120D, Rehearsal and Performance: Children's Theatre Ms. Trow and Leighton reported that the units and hours had been adjusted to maintain repeatability. . A motion was made and seconded to approve THA 120D. Motion carried
- p. THA 205, Advanced Acting Workshop Ms. Trow noted that all requested changes had been made. A motion was made and seconded to approve THA 205. Motion carried.
- THA 225, Introduction to Playwriting q. Ms. Trow reported that THA 225 was in the TMC. A motion was made and seconded to approve. Motion carried.
- ANTH 101L, Physical Anthropology Laboratory r. Dr. Darcy Wiewall reported on this new course . A motion was made and seconded to approve. Motion carried.

a. ENGL 100. The Research Paper

17 hours total, 1 unit

Mark Hoffer provided information regarding other California universities that offer this type of course. He also noted that the course number was changed from ENGL 104 to ENGL 100. He distributed copies of emails he had received from faculty members who support offering this course. Mr. Hoffer noted that the course could be offered as a basic skills course instead of a transfer course, and he asked for comments from the committee regarding that. He is also considering offering it as a pass/no pass. A motion was made to approve ENGL 100 as a transferrable level course as either pass/no pass or for credit. Motion seconded and carried.

Eugenie Trow and Jonet Leighton reported that the repeatability had been removed and that these courses were not part of the TMC but were part of the local degree. Mrs. Lowry expressed concern that these classes were not directly transferrable when the Chancellor's Office has stated that our top priority should be transferrable courses. A motion was made and seconded to approve THA 130, THA 215, THA 218 and THA 220. Motion carried.

## 11. ACTION ITEM: THIRD READING – New Course Development

a. ENGR 125, Introduction to MATLAB, Simulink, Stateflow 3 hrs lec/ 3 hrs lab, 4 units
 Dr. Richard Colgren reported that he had made the changes that the committee had recommended. A motion was made and seconded to approve ENGR 125. Motion carried.

## 12. ACTION ITEM: FIRST READING - New Course Development

a. HD 102, Soldiers to Scholars

Dr. Bob Harris stated that this course was approved last year as a 1½ unit course, but it has been rewritten as a 3 unit class. Dr. Harris discussed the need for this course and noted that it is not only for veterans who have had active military duty, but also for their family and friends as well. Mrs. Lowry stated that it would be helpful to have a list of some of the colleges who offer these courses. Dr. Harris will bring HD 102 back to the committee in the spring.

- b. KIN 181, Organization and Administration of Athletics and Fitness
- c. KIN 182, Sport Psychology

Dr. Glenn Haller reported that each of these two classes are taught in the community colleges in California and also in private schools in the state. However, these are upper division course work in the CSU system. Mrs. Lowry stated that we can only offer lower division classes according to our charter. Dr. Haller agreed to bring back information where these courses are offered in the lower division.

LAC 299, Master Tutor
 Ms. Flores Kagan explained that LAC 299 is part of the trilogy planned for the training of AVC tutors and tutors in the community. This course is designed for supervisors of tutors and meets CRLA certification. A motion was made and seconded to approve LAC 299. Motion carried.
