



PLANNING PROCESS | Workgroup Meetings


To foster open dialogue and collaborative discussions, we established a series of workgroup meetings. These sessions included key groups such as the President’s Cabinet, the Facilities Services Planning Committee, Convocation/Flex Day Committee, and the Board of Trustees. Held both in person and virtually, these meetings commenced in January 2024 and continued through the duration of the project, concluding in September 2024.



PLANNING PROCESS | Campus-wide Online Survey

The campus-wide online survey, conducted from March 19 to March 28, 2024, successfully engaged over 300 participants, including students, educators, and staff. This extensive survey served as a vital tool for capturing a broad spectrum of perspectives on campus life, gathering in-depth feedback on both the successes of current initiatives and the areas in need of improvement.

Through this rigorous data collection effort, the campus community contributed valuable insights into their experiences and identified key opportunities for enhancing the campus environment and academic experience.



PLANNING PROCESS | Data Informed




For which reasons would you most prefer to come to campus?



DISTRICT SERVICE AREA

Antelope Valley College (AVC) is centrally located in the heart of the Antelope Valley, a region in northern Los Angeles County, and primarily serves the region's residents, including cities such as Lancaster and Palmdale.

AVC acts as an educational hub for northern Los Angeles County, providing a range of academic programs, vocational training, and community education services.

The Lancaster campus is strategically positioned to serve a diverse community across the valley and is conveniently situated near the Antelope Valley Freeway (CA-14), which provides direct access to the campus. AVC's Palmdale Center and Fox Airfield locations further extend the college's reach within the region.



PALMDALE CENTER

The AVC Palmdale Center is in the southern end of the Antelope Valley in Northern Los Angeles County.

Comprised of the Administration building, Classroom building, and the Palmdale Technical Center, the site supports the diverse community of students from the surrounding cities of Palmdale, Littlerock, Acton, Sun Village, and Lake Los Angeles.

The Antelope Valley College Palmdale Center provides students access to a range of academic, vocational, and general education pathways, student services, and academic support services.



FOX AIRFIELD

AVC offers Aeronautical courses at General William J. Fox Airfield (Fox Airfield) a county-owned, public airport northwest of Lancaster, California.

AVC serves students from Los Angeles County and the Antelope Valley region. The teaching center at Fox Airfield provides a hands-on training environment equipped with operable aircraft and up-to-date technology, allowing students to gain practical experience in aircraft maintenance, assembly, and fabrication.

Antelope Valley is home to major aerospace companies like Lockheed Martin and Northrop Grumman.




LANCASTER CAMPUS

Building Age

CAMPUS TODAY

Building Condition

The Facility Condition Index (FCI) is a tool used to gauge the physical condition of a building. The California Community College Chancellor's Office surveys colleges regularly to assess conditions and assign an FCI score. The FCI score for a building represents the ratio of the cost to renovate versus the cost to replace it.

A significant number of buildings at Antelope Valley College exhibit either a low or FCI score, indicating that they should be evaluated for potential modernization or replacement.



THE FUTURE CAMPUS

SOAR High School

The new SOAR High School building will replace temporary facilities and provide a permanent location for the successful High School program. The new facility will include improved teaching and learning environments, integrate the latest technological innovations and adapt to flexible teaching methods.

Situated on the west edge of the campus core, close to parking and a safe drop-off area, this location maximizes opportunities to create an identifiable high school zone within the context of the overall college campus. Connections to core instructional areas, The Commons, and the active Centennial Plaza will be maximized to improve integration of SOAR high school students into the heart of AVC.




THE FUTURE CAMPUS

Fine Arts Complex

The new Fine Arts Complex is recommended to replace underperforming and aging facilities and support the projected program needs. The new complex will consolidate functions currently located in the Fine Arts quad, support current and projected program needs and promote interdisciplinary collaboration.



Aerospace Center for Excellence



Gymnasium / PE Complex













Around half of students and faculty are on-campus for all of their classes.





Students reported that their top reasons for their participation model were making their schedules work (27%) and balancing their personal commitments and educational goals (25%)


The average hybrid schedule is a mix of:





Preferences are shifting towards more hybrid class schedules and experiences.



For which reasons would you most prefer to come to campus?



Where would you prefer to do the following activities, either in-person or virtually?




Where would you prefer to do the following activities, either in-person or virtually?




70% of students find access to quiet / acoustic privacy an important quality for spaces on campus.


There is opportunity to improve access to spaces for decompression, physical activity and food options on campus.

In your experience, how effective are the following student services and centers in responding to your needs?



Students and Faculty report the highest satisfaction when participating virtually, but overall satisfaction with their current modes are high.


STUDENTS - Overall, how satisfied are you with participating in...
