
A School for Students With High Potential

Nontraditional Program

SOAR is a school of choice that focuses on early college for high school students. 




SOAR High School

SOAR High School is designed to promote academic achievement, social maturity, and enhanced economic opportunities through the completion of high school and success in college.

SOAR High School embraces the core principles of the Early College High School (ECHS) Initiative, including improving the graduation rates by creating a flexible high school year, by compressing the number of years to complete a college degree and by removing financial and other barriers to college.

SOAR is a school designed to create rigor, depth, and intensity of learning for students at an earlier age, while inspiring under-represented high school students to work hard and stretch themselves intellectually with the support of parental guidance and a unique learning community. Although achieving an associate degree is possible, graduating from high school with a successful college experience is the goal of the program. After high school graduation, students can continue to pursue their degree at AVC. All students have the opportunity to apply for the California Promise program for possible financial support; the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is a requirement for this opportunity.

Who should apply?

- Current 8th grade students
- Low socio-economic family status
- First generation college-going youth
- Under-represented students
- Students under performing in a traditional setting who have the potential to be successful
- Students who are able to work collaboratively and are up for a challenge

Criteria for Selection

- Completed application
- Most recent California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP)—baseline "standard nearly met" or above in Language Arts and Math
- Most current report card (Baseline 2.0 GPA)
- Parent and student interview
- Review of attendance, behavioral history, etc.
- Recommendations from middle school teachers
