Getting Involved

SOAR High School students will be integrated into college-life activities. In addition, college orientation will be incorporated in the high school foundation class (AVID College Seminar) to meet AVC's matriculation steps. Each student will meet with counseling staff and work on college career planning.

A Unique Program

The understanding and respect for the unique nature of SOAR will be emphasized through contacts with parents and students. SOAR students will be immersed in the college culture and be treated as college students with respect to student involvement activities.

in the traditional educational system. SOAR
High School is designed to promote academic
achievement, social maturity, and enhanced
economic opportunities through the completion
of high school and success in college.

SOAR High School embraces the Core
Principles of the Early College High School
(ECHS) Initiative including improving the
graduation rates by creating a flexible high
school year, by compressing the number
of years to complete a college degree, and
removing financial and other barriers to college.

Goals

This unique program has high goals in mind: Encourage students to pursue higher education.

- Bring together a community of learners.
- Provide a supportive and caring educational environment.
- Ensure opportunities for learning in an academically rigorous and flexible environment that stretches students intellectually.
- Assist students to become self-directed in solving problems using oral and written communication, critical thinking, listening skills, planning and decision making skills, information literacy, and a variety of technologies in becoming responsible for their education.
- Encourage students to demonstrate good citizenship and teamwork through respect, tolerance and cultural awareness.

SOAR is a school designed to create rigor, depth and intensity of learning for students at an earlier age, and to inspire underachieving and underprepared high school students to work hard and stretch themselves intellectually.

Mho Can Apply?

Students who fall within the following criteria can apply:

- Current 8th grade students
- Low socioeconomic status
- First generation college-going youth
- Underrepresented students
- Students underperforming in a traditional setting who have the potential to be successful

Criteria for Selection

To be considered the following criteria will be used:

- Completed application by family
- Most recent (7th grade) California State

 Test scores (Baseline Basic level or above in Language Arts and Math)
- 8th grade report card first and second progress report (Baseline 2.00 GPA)
- Parent and student interview
- Student written essay (completed during the interview process)
- Prior educational experience (attendance, discipline, etc.)
- Recommendation from the middle school
