FACULTY WORKSHOPS

9:45 – 11:15 Session I (1.5 hrs. Faculty Academy Standard #1 Credit)

A. Integrated Planning, Tina McDermott - SSV 151

SLOs, Program Review, Educational Master Plan, budget, and planning -- oh my! If these words make your head swim, then this is the workshop for you. Find out how these processes work and interconnect to strengthen student success and implement campus goals. The presenters will help you understand the important role that faculty play in writing meaningful reports based on quantitative and qualitative data that feed into budget and planning decisions. No longer will you feel that your SLOs are "just numbers" or that program review "sits on someone's shelf." You will see the integration of these mandated reports and processes and how they truly represent our collective vision for student success and the means to implement that vision.

B. Understanding Your Health Benefits, Dr. Susan Lowry – HS 201

Every year, each of us makes a decision that potentially saves or costs us thousands of dollars: WHAT HEALTH CARE PLAN WILL I ENROLL IN? Results from our surveys this summer suggest that cost is overwhelmingly the faculty's largest health care concern at present. All faculty: full time, part time and retired who are concerned about health care costs, should come to this presentation and discussion about health care plans and what we might do in the future to keep costs down.

C. Career Counseling Tools for Faculty, Andres Cruzalegui - LH 100

The Career Center at AVC now offers more resources and services to help students explore and define their career goals and corresponding academic plans. Occupational databases, career assessments, workshops and one-on-one advisement are just some of the resources students can utilize during the career development process. In alignment with the Student Success Act (SB 1456), the counseling division will be expanding career-related services to meet the needs of a large population of undeclared students. Faculty across campus should be aware of these valuable resources as they impact student success, retention and overall institutional efficiency.

D. Student Discipline, Gary Roggenstein, Deputy Murgatroyd - LH 102

The specific focus of this activity will be relevant to faculty as it will address expected student behavior in the classroom, on the campus or at college sponsored activities and the disciplinary consequences students may encounter when failing to meet expectations. Participants will be exposed to a progressive discipline system that appropriately employs behavior intervention strategies and/or referrals to the AVC Director of Student Services or the LA County Sheriff's Department at AVC. The presentation will include clearly defined disciplinary procedures and guidelines that facilitate shared insight, communication and collaboration that strengthen the student behavior intervention and disciplinary network of AVC. A functional goal of this activity will be to inform and develop. Participants will be provided with relevant policy information, i.e., Education Code, Board Policy, local, state and federal laws that serve as the regulatory backbone of the AVC disciplinary system and will also be encouraged to provide ideas and input into the disciplinary procedures and practices at AVC that will be discussed.

A. Andragogy in Online Education, Dr. Nancy Bednar - HS 201

People learn in different ways. We used to just discuss pedagogy, as if the teaching of children was the only type of learning that concerned instructors. But, for almost 200 years, professors began to realize that adults learn differently than children do. So, as we design online classes, because we teach adults, we need not explore pedagogy in online education. We need to explore andragogy in online education. The goal of this presentation is to link the principles of andragogy with the design of online and hybrid courses.
