1. CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

The Academic Senate meeting of April 21, 2016 was called to order at 3:04 p.m. by Dr. Irit Gat, Academic Senate Vice President.

2. OPENING COMMENTS FROM THE SENATE PRESIDENT

Dr. Ed Beyer, Senate President was absent as he was attending the 2016 Academic Senate California Community College (ASCCC) Spring Plenary Session.

3. OPEN COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

- Angelyn Ancheta introduced herself as a co-presenter with Roderick Mendoza regarding the discussion item 7.a. AB 798 College Textbook Affordability Act of 2015.
- Dr. Ken Shafer expressed irritation with the new rule announced by the President, that anyone on campus after hours must report to campus security. He feels the mandate is ridiculous and insulting.
- Karen Lubick noted an email from Dr. Ed Beyer regarding hiring committees for deans was
 unclear whether adjunct faculty may apply. This has created an issue in the Language Arts
 division.

a. AB 798 College Textbook Affordability Act of 2015 – Rod Mendoza (attachments)
 AB 798 Bill Language

Passed ASO AB 798 Resolution

Mr. Roderick Mendoza and Ms. Angelyn Ancheta addressed senators to discuss a draft resolution in support of AB 798 – see attachments. Upon approval AVC would be eligible to a \$50,000 grant. The deadline to apply is June 30. Several people on campus including President Knudson support the proposal.

Opposition is from traditional professors who rely heavily on textbook.

Members expressed concern regarding student access. It was noted PDF can be placed in Blackboard; all students have access to a computer and printer.

It was suggested the organization offer a town hall meeting to show what is available, as there is a considerable misinformation.

Mr. Mendoza and Ms. Ancheta asked the Academic Senate to draft a joint resolution with the Associated Student Organization (ASO).

Senators expressed concern with an ability to meet the deadline. It was suggested the item be agendized for the May 5, 20216 meeting and pull it off if the proposal is not ready.

Dr. Gat commended both for creating the opportunity for students and suggested they have another meeting with the Senate Executive.

Dr. Lowry suggested adding it to the agenda for the May 5, 2016 meeting, and pull if not ready.

b. BP and AP Review – Feedback

No feedback.

c. Faculty Recognition Day Finances – Dr. Susan Lowry

Dr. Lowry reported the Faculty Recognition Day Committee gathered money for the Scholar in Residence and Outstanding Adjunct awards as well as food for the event. She suggested a fund be created through the foundation with payroll deduction earmarked for the event.

Dr. Lowry spoke with Dianne Knipple who informed her Schools First is interest in block funding at a \$10,000 level. Dr. Lowry expressed concern that event titles would then include the sponsor's name. She is considering backing away from the foundation President's Circle and putting the money toward self-funding faculty events. Tax-deductible payment options include automatic payroll deductions or PayPal payments. Dr. Lowry will follow-up with Ms. Knipple.

Dr. Lowry encouraged senators to help promote the faculty-brag project.

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On March 21 the CCC Bpard of Governors unanimously approve a plan to change accreditation.

From the release:

The resolution approved unanimously by the board comes a week after college presidents and district chancellors voted overwhelmingly to pursue a dual approach to improve the operations and governance of the current accreditor, the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC), while planning for the ultimate transition to an accreditor that would include all higher education institutions in the Western region.

The Board of Governors declared that the community college system's establishment of a bachelor's degree program and its strengthened transfer pathways, such as the Associate Degree for Transfer program and the UC Transfer Pathways, require peer review from four-year colleges and universities to ensure top quality for students.

"This change in accreditation, though it may take several years to implement, makes sense given that our colleges will start offering the bachelor's degree and because our state's four-year institutions are increasingly reliant on transfers from community colleges," said Board of Governors President Geoffrey L. Baum. "During this transition, an improved ACCJC will continue to serve California Community Colleges."

The most salient part of the resolution reads:

Participate with the Chief Executive Officers and their colleges in coordination of planning groups to:

a. Recommend immediate changes to improve the existing processes and culture of ACCJC including, but not limited to, enhanced financial transparency, reformed governance and leadership, better communication with member institutions, and more effective training during the next two years to ensure continuity of accreditation for the system's colleges, and

b. Lead a change in accreditation structure that aligns all segments of higher education in California, including coordinating planning discussions with the WASC Senior College and University Commission (WSCUC) as well as the other community colleges in California that are not in our system and the community colleges of Hawaii and the Pacific islands currently accredited by ACCJC.

Part two is in regard to AB 798

Creates the Open Educational Resources Adoption Incentive Program to provide incentives and reward campus, staff, and faculty efforts to accelerate the adoption of open educational resources.

The law require specified moneys for the program be used by campuses to create and support faculty and staff professional development, open educational resource curation activities, curriculum modification, or technology support for faculty, staff, and students, as specified.

The law authorizes the local academic senate of a campus of the California State University or the California Community Colleges to

- (A) adopt a local campus resolution to increase student access to high-quality open educational resources and reduce the cost of textbooks and supplies for students, and
- (B) upon adoption of the resolution, develop a specified plan, in collaboration with students and the administration, that describes evidence of the campus' commitment and readiness to spend grant money from the fund to support faculty adoption of open educational resources.

The law requires the California Open Education Resources Council to review and approve the plan, and, if it meets these and other specified requirements, would authorize the Chancellor of the California State University to award an initial grant of up to \$50,000 to the campus from the fund.

The law requires additional bonus grants to be distributed to participating campuses if certain benchmarks are met.

The law caps the number of initial grants that may be approved by the California Open Education Resources Council each award year at 100.

B202.0 Procedures for all Standing Committees

B202.1 Each standing committee shall have:

- · A statement of purpose in compliance with the mission of the college
- Membership list that includes term dates
- Statement of meeting times and frequencies
- Statement of reporting responsibilities

B202.2 Each standing committee shall:

- Circulate a "Call for Agenda Items" immediately following the previous meeting.
- Distribute to members and post an agenda 72 hours prior to a meeting.
- Distribute to members and post minutes immediately following their approval.
- Include in minutes a brief summary of discussion regarding actions taken, including motions made, seconded, passed, or defeated.
- Shall make decisions by a simple majority vote.
- B202.3 While Standing Committees are not required to follow the Brown Act, no committee may run their meetings outside of the Act's dictates without two-thirds approval by the full Senate
- B202.4 Senate committees make decisions autonomously within the scope of their statement of purpose as approved by the Senate.

B202.4.1 All Committees shall gain Senate approval for:

- Committee recommendations which the Senate will send to bodies outside the Senate purview.
- Policy changes
- Changes related to the composition of the committee
- Selection procedures of committee members or Chair, Faculty Co-chair or coordinator.

B202.5 Termination of Standing Committees

- B202.5.1 Standing Committees may be terminated in two ways.
 - B202.5.1.1 A Petition to Terminate shall be submitted by the Executive Committee.
 - B202.5.1.2A Simple Majority vote of the members of the Standing Committee recommending the termination shall be submitted to the Executive Committee.
- B202.5.2 Once a proper petition is received by the Executive Committee, the following procedure shall be used:
 - B202.5.2.1 The petition shall be sent to the Full Senate for acceptance by a simple majority vote.
 - B202.5.2.2The President shall appoint an Ad Hoc Committee to examine the viability of terminating the committee.
 - B202.5.2.3The Ad Hoc Committee shall, within 14 days of its formation, send its findings and recommendations to the Executive Committee.
 - B202.5.2.4The Executive Committee shall then place the Ad Hoc Committee's recommendation to the Full Senate.
 - B202.5.2.4.1. If the recommendation is to terminate the Standing Committee, the recommendation must be ratified by a two-thirds majority of the Senate in accordance with §101.2.4 of the Constitution.
 - B202.5.2.4.2. If the recommendation is not ratified, the Standing Committee will not be terminated.
 - B202.5.2.5 If the recommendation is to continue the Standing Committee, the recommendation must be ratified by a one-thirds plus one vote of the Senate
 - B202.5.2.5.1. If the recommendation to continue is not ratified by a one-thirds plus one vote, there will be an immediate vote to terminate in accordance with B202.5.2.4.1.
 - B202.5.2.5.2. If the vote to terminate does not meet two-thirds ratification, the Standing Committee will not be terminated.
- B203.0 Chairs, Faculty co-Chairs and Coordinators
 - B203.1 General provisions for all Chairs, Faculty co-Chairs and Coordinators

- B203.1.1 All Chairs, Faculty co-Chairs or Coordinators must be tenured regular faculty.
- B203.1.2 No individual, except the President or the President's designee filling in a vacancy, shall be a Chair, Faculty co-Chair or Coordinator for more than one Senate Standing Committee at one time.
- B203.1.3 Compensation (stipends, release time, etc.) for all Chairs, Faculty co-Chairs and Coordinators are managed through the collective bargaining process. The most current compensation figures can be found in the Faculty Contract as well as Appendix section A301.0

B204.0 Committee Representatives

- B204.1 The Academic Senate shall determine the size, scope and membership of all Academic Senate standing committees.
- B204.2 The following procedures will be used for the selection of committee members.
 - B204.2.1 Upon the creation of a new Academic Senate committee or the pending vacancy or vacancies of an existing committee for members other than the chair, the Academic Senate President in the name of the entire Senate shall notify all faculty of the vacancy or vacancies.
 - B204.2.2 This notice must include the specific goals and purposes of the committee and the specific responsibilities of the committee members as well as any qualifications required.
 - B204.2.3 Posting of the notice shall occur at least fourteen calendar days prior to the beginning of a new committee's work or the expiration of the term of the member or members of an existing committee.
 - B204.2.4 All interested individuals who wish to be considered for membership on a Senate committee must submit a letter of interest that addresses the purpose and goals of the committee to the Executive Committee along with any other documentation requested in the call.
 - B204.2.5 If the number of candidates is less than or equal to the number of vacancies on the committee for which letters of interest have been received those names shall be sent to the Academic Senate as an information item.
 - B204.2.6 If there are more than the number of vacancies on the Committee, then the Executive Committee in conjunction with the Faculty co-Chair of the specific Committee will review the letters of interest and after evaluation of those applications, which may include interviews, shall make the necessary appointments. Those names shall be sent to the Academic Senate as an information item.

The following courses and programs were reviewed and approved by the Academic Policies and Procedures (AP&P) Committee:

Course Revisions Approved by AP&P on November 12, 2015:

1. ACCT 201, Financial Accounting

New Course Development Approved by AP&P on March 10, 2016:

1. ELTE 145, Acceptability of Electronic Assemblies 6 units, 5 Lecture Hrs and 3 Lab Hrs **Requisites**: Advisory: Eligibility for ENGL 099, READ 095, and MATH 070.

Description: This course provides acceptance requirements for the manufacture of electrical and electronic assemblies, specifically in the areas of cable and wire harness assemblies, soldered electrical and electronic assemblies, and quality control testing and inspection. (AVC)

2. KIN 235, Intercollegiate Women's Golf

1-3 units, 54-162 Lab Hrs

Requisites: Limitation on Enrollment: Physical Examination and tryout required.

Description: This course is designed for the female student-athlete who wishes to compete at the intercollegiate level in golf. Course content will emphasize advance golf skills and techniques. The advanced level of competition will require a high level of physical condition on the part of the student. Instruction and practice for intercollegiate competition will include rules of play and strategy.(CSU, UC, AVC) (R2)

3. KIN 245, Intercollegiate Men's Soccer

1-3 units, 54-162 Lab Hrs

Requisites: Limitation on Enrollment: Physical Examination and tryout required.

Description: Designed for the student-athlete who wishes to compete at the intercollegiate level in soccer. Course content will emphasize advanced soccer skills and techniques. The advanced level of competition will require a high level of physical condition on the part of the student. Instruction and practice for the intercollegiate competition will include rules, history, and strategy. (CSU, UC, AVC) (R2)

4. KIN 270, Intercollegiate Men's Volleyball

1-3 units, 54-162 Lab Hrs

Requisites: Limitation on Enrollment: Physical Examination and tryout required.

Description: The course is designed for the student-athlete who wishes to compete at the varsity intercollegiate level in men's volleyball. Advanced men's volleyball skills and techniques will be emphasized. The course is designed to assist the athlete in acquiring the necessary conditioning needed for competition. All phases of advanced offensive and defensive strategies will be presented. The course will teach the athletes the playing rules and code of conduct. (CSU, UC, AVC) (R2)

1. High Intermediate ESL, Certification of Completion (Noncredit)

The High Intermediate ESL Certificate of Completion is awarded to ESL students who successfully complete the three Level 4 ESL courses (ESL 040, ESL 043, and ESL 048) and at least one of the eight electives from the previous three levels.

The prerequisite skills are those of the three Level 3 courses (ESL 030, ESL 033, and ESL 038), which include: aural recognition and oral production of intermediate vocabulary in written and/or oral discourse; aural recognition and oral production of intermediate vowel and consonant segments, as well as the suprasegmentals of stress, intonation, and reductions; production of an intermediate written and/or oral discourse using the past, present, and future tenses combined with the simple, progressive and perfect aspects; production of a basic written and/or oral discourse using a variety of pronoun forms (including reflexives and reciprocals); production of a basic written and/or oral discourse using a variety of gerunds, infinitives, and articles; reading comprehension of an intermediate level text; written proficiency of a complete paragraph (100 words and 3 paragraphs) in an interactive (dialogue), descriptive (simple present tense), narrative (past tense), or expository (opinion) style.

The objectives of this certificate include:

aural recognition and oral production of high-intermediate (academic) vocabulary in written and/or oral discourse; aural and oral production of high-intermediate vowel and consonant segments, as well as the suprasegmentals of stress, intonation, reductions, and linking; production of advanced written and/or discourse using the past, present, and future tenses combined with the simple, progressive, and perfect aspects in both the active and passive voice; production of a basic written and/or oral discourse using past modals, adjective clauses, noun clauses, and conditional clause; production of a basic written and/or oral discourse using a phrasal verbs and indirect speech

forms; reading comprehension of high-intermediate level text; writing of a complete essay (200 words and 5 paragraphs) in an interactive (dialogue), descriptive (simple present tense), narrative (past tense), expository (opinion), or procedural/hortatory style.
