### Blackboard Not So Distant

After eight months of gathering data and examining distance education options, AVC has signed a contract with Blackboard that will allow faculty to use a topnotch distance education course management system. Starting as early as this summer, and definitely in the fall, faculty will have the opportunity to integrate

Blackboard into their online and campus classes. The Distance Education Committee is working to establish and coordinate training opportunities, workshops, and mentor programs for faculty wanting to use Blackboard. Workshops will begin in the summer and continue through the fall and spring semesters.

# AVC Submits Early College Proposal

The Antelope Valley College District and the Antelope Valley Joint Union High School District have submitted a joint proposal to the California Community College Foundation to form an Early College High School (ECHS) on the AVC campus. If the proposal is accepted, the ECHS, which is tentatively called S.O.A.R. High (for Students on the Academic Rise), could start next fall. The school would have a Math, Science, and Engineering focus. The goal of the project is to target students with high academic ability who might not ordinarily consider college a possibility because of their socio economic status or other considerations. This national program is supported by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, the Kellogg Foundation, the Ford Foundation, the Carnegie Corporation of New York and other funding sources.



Students who are currently in the eighth grade would be invited to apply based on test scores. Each student and his/her parents must submit transcripts and an application which would be reviewed by a joint committee of AVC and AVUHSD administrators and faculty. Finalists would appear for an interview with the selection committee. Students must be willing to forgo some of the traditional extra curricular activities that are common with high schools. Parental support and involvement is a requirement of the program. Students with significant disciplinary problems would not be accepted.

Students at S.O.A.R. High would take the standard high school curriculum delivered by high school teachers and monitored by an on-site principal. All students must pass the high school exit exam to graduate. However, students will gradually be introduced to the college curriculum as they become eligible. Students must complete the AVC assessment to determine appropriate levels for college classes. The planners hope that these students may be able to complete high school and get an associates degree or a certificate within five years. Although the Foundation suggests that the total enrollment be no more that 400 students, the most successful program in the state has only 280 enrolled. The target enrollment for fall is seventy students. For more information, contact Dorothy Williams

## 2005-2006 Academic Senate Grant Program

The following grant proposals were approved for funding through the Senate Grant Program:

- **Dr. Cynthia Lehman** and **Michael Traina**: Dr. Lehman and Mr. Traina will again host the World Cinema Night, which brings foreign film to be screened with its director. The Senate support enables AVIFF to bring an international filmmaker to the spring events benefiting students, faculty and the community. (Senate has requested measurable outcomes.)
- **Dr. David Newby**: Dr. Newby is attempting to increase student opportunity to live performances that are enrolled in several different music courses. Students will submit one-page concert typed review, using specific criteria/elements from the discipline to discuss the impact on student learning.
- John Vento: In the fall 2004, Mr. Vento spearheaded the Model United Nations (MUN) Program. This year, sixteen students will participate in the UC Berkeley's MUN conference in Spring 2006. Some of the identified objectives that students will master are: demonstrate the art of persuasion and negotiation, state the principles and practices of the UN, and come to consensus on complex issues.
- Charles Hood: This proposal supports the establishment of a first time AVC online digital archive of visual resources. The digital resources will include study works from art history, images of the major cultural sites in Los Angeles, historic images, top news pictures, magazine advertisements, and famous works of architecture. Special emphasis will be on works from under-representative groups, such as L.A. 's Chicano artists. Second, it will be low-tech, but high-resource. The archive should recreate as much of the artists skill and subtlety as possible, starting with the quality of scans.
- **Dawn Jacobs**: Ms. Jacobs wishes to obtain necessary equipment to videotape speeches in the public speaking classes. Self-evaluation and reflection are an integral part of the success of becoming a better speaker. As students build skills and abilities, the video speeches offer them the opportunity to use critical thinking in their own speeches, but to others as well.
- Dr. Lee Grishman: This proposal will offer diverse student population an opportunity to participate on a focus Northern institution university tour. Students will travel to Cal Poly SLO, CSU East Bay (formerly Hayward), the new UC Merced Campus, UC Davis, UC Berkeley, CSU Monterey Bay, SFSU, CSU Sacramento, CSU Chico, and UC Santa Cruz. Over 30 students are interested in participating on the focus tour.
- Dorothy Williams and Audrey Moore: This proposal will provide a pilot summer bridge academy for approximately 40 athletes and Special Program Students. The program will involve assessments of learning skills deficiencies followed by a series of targeted study skills workshops. The academy will work toward students becoming excited about coming to college, feel welcome, and to make them a part of "something bigger than themselves."
- Mark Branner: This proposal will support theatrical performances that celebrate cultural diversity. The Dragon Wakes performance is a collaborative creation that explores the rise of modem China. A second performance, Barumun, is a gigantic celebration of the circus arts (both east and west), requiring specialized training and supervision in trapeze, tightrope, and acrobatics. Mr. Zheng an international artist and artistic director from China will be invited to work with Theatre Arts faculty, in training student actors and dancers in the art of physical performance. Fifty performance tickets will be made available to students and instructional equipment will be purchased with grant funds.
