AJ 206 Criminology Honors Option Project

Carlos Pinho

Overview:

This Honors Option will require the student to write a research paper involving one of the numerous Social Process Theories in Criminology. You will write a paper that details the main components of the theory you select as well as your understanding as to how they relate to potential criminal and the study of criminology as a whole. Criminological theories are having an impact on individual criminals and the criminal justice process. It is hoped that this will make you want to look further into the field of Criminology and assist others in their understanding of what drives crime.

Honors students who successfully complete the assignment will gain an increased understanding of how these theories play a role in the making of both criminals and non-criminals in our society and how different listed institutions can affect our overall crime rate and community safety. They will need to exercise writing and critical thinking skills, which are applicable across all disciplines.

Objectives:

- Provide content about the history or background of the field being studied.
- Show an awareness of some of the field's major theories or current trends.
- Utilizes research methods including proper documentation of the discipline.
- Help students to demonstrate critical thinking and/or meta-cognitive abilities.

Assignment:

The Honors Option requires the student to successfully complete all AJ 206 included course work and then write a review of one of numerous Social Process Theories in Criminology. Within this area of Criminology, the student shall select a theory such as Social Control Theory, Labeling Theory, Social Learning Theory or Differential Association Theory. The student will also review at least two different criminological sources, besides the textbook. The project research paper will explain the main components of the selected theory; the methods used to identify the theory's findings; the student's personal thoughts as to how these components and findings relate to a potential criminal, the criminal justice process, and the field of Criminology as a whole; and identifying individual study results to corroborate the review and critiques of the theory.

This project will require extensive critical and analytical thinking. The paper must be submitted in APA format, with a minimum of 7 pages.

STANDARD 2: College Colloquia, Committees, and Campus Activities

Promote faculty interaction, collegiality, and professional growth through the intellectual exchange of ideas across various disciplines, support lifelong learning skills by examining culturally diverse perspectives in the arts, sciences, and humanities, and enhance the internal governance and operations of Antelope Valley College through a spirit of collaboration.

Full-time Faculty may complete the remainder of their obligation in this area, or move to Standard 3 after 15 hours have been met.

- •Standard 2 may be satisfied through participation in college colloquia and field trips and any other events listed in the Faculty Professional Development Program Calendar. A standard AVC Trip Request is required for all out-of-district travel and must be approved by the appropriate Dean prior to travel. If you are using the request for flex credit only, you are not required to obtain additional signatures other than that of your Dean. Maintain one copy for your records and forward one copy to the senate office.
- Faculty academy and college colloquia presenters and coordinators may also claim preparation hours within this standard in accordance with the guidelines set forth in this book.
- Faculty must sign-in at the beginning of the event and sign-out upon leaving the event in order to receive professional development credit.
- Standard 2 may also be satisfied through participation in campus shared governance committees, program review, and the tenure and evaluation process.

Faculty must participate in shared governance committees as part of their regularly assigned duties **before** they may earn professional development credit for any additional campus committee work. The only exceptions are the participation in the Academic Policies and Procedures Committee and the Outcomes Committee where members may claim up to 20 hours for the committee alone.

Faculty members earning reassigned time for committee work may not claim those hours toward fulfillment of their professional development obligation.

The following activities are eligible in this standard only in lieu of being paid:

Database Facilitators (.5 hours/section) max 20 hours

Tenure Chair of Probationary Faculty (1st – 3rd year) 20 hours per committee

Tenure Chair of Probationary Faculty (4th year) 10 hours per committee

Adjunct Faculty Evaluations 8 hours maximum per evaluation - 10 hours max
