POLS C1000H - American Govt & Politics Honors CRN 53488 MW 11:00am - 2:10pm Cedar Hall 132 Vento, John

This course is an introduction to government and politics in the United States and California. Students examine the constitutions, structure, and operation of governing institutions, civil liberties and civil rights, political behaviors, political issues, and public policy using political science theory and methodology. This is an honors course. This honors course, intended for students in the Honors Transfer Program. Analysis of the national government of the United States and of the government of California, the structure and interaction of legislative, executive, and judicial branches and the processes of government in the contemporary world. Treatment of American institutions as documented in the Constitution of the United States. The honors course provides more content and requires greater intensity and depth of study than the non-honors class. Formerly POLS 101H (C-ID: POLS 110) (UC, CSU, AVC) Note: Students may take either POLS C1000 American Government and Politics or POLS C1000H American Government and Politics - Honors. Duplicate credit will not be awarded.

ANTH 112H - Native North Americans Honors CRN 79160 TR 12:30pm - 1:50pm Uhazy Hall 223 Wiewall, Darcy

This honors course, intended for students in the Honors Transfer Program, provides a general survey of the origins and development of Native American cultures in North America from antiquity to the present examining their social, cultural, political, and economic history. Using an interdisciplinary approach, the course examines applicable methods and theories to understand the rich and diverse cultural systems encountered by Europeans in the sixteenth century, the impact of contact on both Native and Euroamerican cultures, and the contemporary realities of indigenous peoples. Students are expected to develop a substantial general knowledge of Native American peoples, their cultural history, resistance, agency, sovereignty, and diversity. The honors course provides more content and requires greater intensity and depth of study than the non-honors class. (UC, CSU, AVC) Note: Students may take either ANTH 112 Native North Americans or ANTH 112H Native North Americans Honors. Duplicate credit will not be awarded.

ARTH C1100H - Survey of Art Pre-Medieval Honors **CRN 79315 MW 2:00pm - 3:20pm Cedar Hall 115 Mugnolo, Christine**

This course introduces students to visual art and architecture from prehistory to the medieval era with a focus on art from Europe, North Africa, and the near East. The course will further consider global interactions involving these regions. This is an honors course. ARTH C1100H is survey of paintings, sculpture and architecture in the Western tradition, starting from human beginnings until 1300; it is taught at honors level. The course examines functions and meanings of art and architecture within historical, social, cultural and philosophical contexts of the regions. Slide lectures and class discussions examine functions and meanings of artworks from ancient civilizations in Mesopotamia, Egypt, Greece, and Rome. In the latter part of the course, Late Antiquity, Byzantine, Early Medieval, Romanesque and Gothic Arts will be discussed according to their aesthetic, socio-political, religious, historical, technological, and cultural contexts. The honors course requires greater intensity and in-depth of study than the non-honors class. Formerly ART 101H (C-ID: ARTH 110H) (UC, CSU, AVC) Note: Students may take either ARTH C1100 Survey of Art from Prehistory to the Medieval Era or ARTH C1100H Survey of Art from Prehistory to the Medieval Era - Honors. Duplicate credit will not be awarded. This honors course is intended for students in the Honors Transfer Program.

COMM C1000H - Intro to Public Speaking Honors **CRN 79226 TR 12:30-1:50pm Yoshida Hall 102 Razook, Aley**

In this course, students learn and apply foundational rhetorical theories and techniques of public speaking in a multicultural democratic society. Students discover, develop, and critically analyze ideas in public discourse through research, reasoning, organization, composition, delivery to a live audience, and evaluation of various types of speeches, including informative and persuasive speeches. This is an honors course. The honors course provides more content and requires greater intensity and depth of study than the non-honors class. Formerly COMM 101H (UC, CSU, AVC) Note: Students may take either COMM C1000 Introduction to Public Speaking or COMM C1000H Introduction to Public Speaking - Honors. Duplicate credit will not be awarded. This honors course is intended for students in the Honors Transfer Program.

ECON C2002H - Principles of Macroeconomics Honors **CRN 79577 TR 2:00pm - 3:20pm Sage Hall 217 Ganley, Ibrahim**

An introductory course using models of the domestic and international economy to understand national income, unemployment, inflation, economic growth, inequality, the financial system, and monetary, fiscal, and other economic policies. This is an honors course. Prerequisite: Placement as determined by the college's multiple measures assessment process or completion of a course taught at or above the level of elementary algebra. Formerly ECON 101H (C-ID: ECON 202) (UC, CSU, AVC). Note: Students may take either ECON C2002 Principles of Macroeconomics or ECON C2002H Principles of Macroeconomics Honors. Duplicate credit will not be awarded.

ENGL C1000H - Academic Reading & Writing Honors **CRN 79540 TR 12:30pm - 2:35pm Cedar Hall 325 Perez, Annamarie**

In this course, students receive instruction in academic reading and writing, including writing processes, effective use of language, analytical thinking, and the foundations of academic research. This is an honors course. Prerequisite: Placement as determined by the college's multiple measures assessment process ENGL C1000 empowers students to explore texts and ideas from a variety of diverse voices and to enter into conversations with creative thinkers, scholars, and global citizens. Students in ENGL C1000 have many opportunities for extra support, including supplemental learning assistance provided by visiting The Learning Center. This is an honors course, intended for students in the Honors Transfer Program. The honors course provides more content and requires greater intensity and depth of study than the non-honors class. Formerly ENGL 101H (C-ID: ENGL 100) (UC, CSU, AVC) Note: Students may take either ENGL C1000 Academic Reading and Writing or ENGL C1000H Academic Reading and Writing - Honors. Duplicate credit will not be awarded.

ENGL C1001H - Critical Thinking & Writing Honors **CRN 79138 MW 11:00am - 12:20pm Cedar Hall 325 Jennings Tafarella, Rachel**

In this course, students receive instruction in critical thinking for purposes of constructing, evaluating, and composing arguments in a variety of rhetorical forms, using primarily non-fiction texts, refining writing skills and research strategies developed in ENGL C1000 College Reading and Writing (C-ID ENGL 100) or similar first-year college writing course. This is an honors course. Prerequisite: College-level composition (ENGL C1000/ENGL C1000H/ENGL C1000E/C-ID ENGL 100) or equivalent This honors course is intended for students in the Honors Transfer Program. The honors course provides more content and requires greater intensity and depth of study than the non-honors class. Formerly ENGL 103H (C-ID: ENGL 105) (UC, CSU, AVC) Note: Students may take either ENGL C1001 Critical Thinking and Writing or ENGL C1001H Critical Thinking and Writing - Honors. Duplicate credit will not be awarded.

HIST C1002H - U.S. History since 1865-Honors **CRN 79313 TR 9:30am - 10:50am Mesquite Hall 243 Smith, Denise**

This course is a historical survey of the United States from the end of the Civil War to the present. The course also introduces students to historical reasoning skills. This is an honors course. Includes reference to the postbellum political history of California inside the framework of general United States history. The honors course provides more content and requires greater intensity and depth of study than the non-honors class. Formerly HIST 108H (UC, CSU, AVC) Students may take either HIST C1002 United States History since 1865 or HIST C1002H United States History since 1865 - Honors. Duplicate credit will not be awarded.

MATH 150H - Calculus & Analytic Geometry Honors

CRN 79751 TR 11:00am - 1:30pm Yoshida Hall 115A Osawa, Roy

Prerequisite: Math 140 or Math 149 or placement by multiple measures. This honors course, intended for students in the Honors Transfer Program, is for students planning upper-division work in math, physics, engineering or business. It involves differentiation and integration of algebraic, trigonometric, exponential, and logarithmic functions. Applications include extrema, graphing, related rates, area. The honors course provides more content and requires greater intensity and depth of study than the non-honors class. (UC, CSU, AVC) Note: Students may take either MATH 150 Calculus & Analytic Geometry or MATH 150H Calculus & Analytic Geometry Honors. Duplicate credit will not be awarded.

PHIL 105H - Ethics: Moral Issues in Society CRN 79318 MW 11:00am - 12:20pm Uhazy Hall 201

Mendoza Gonzalez Larreynaga, Alberto This honors course, intended for students in the Honors Transfer Program, is an introduction into the nature of ethics and to the question as to what ethical system, if any determines right and wrong. This course will not only examine certain traditional approaches to ethical questions, but will investigate the possible application of these approaches to current ethical conflicts. An analysis of moral issues, such as violence, sex, war, abortion, capital punishment, privacy, oppression, pornography, and euthanasia will be emphasized. The honors course provides more content and requires greater intensity and depth of study than the non-honors class. (UC, CSU, AVC) Note: Students may take either PHIL105 Ethics: Moral Issues in Society or PHIL105H Ethics: Moral Issues in Society Honors. Duplicate credit will not be awarded.

POLS C1000H - American Govt & Politics Honors

This honors course, intended for students in the Honors Transfer Program, is a broad-based introduction to the various elements of theater including interpretation of plays, understanding of the various elements of a play in production, and survey of theater history and the development of the dramatic form. Play readings are supplemented by discussions and audiovisual aids to increase the student's understanding of the play in performance. The honors course provides more content and requires greater intensity and depth of study than the non-honors class. (UC, CSU, AVC) Note: Students may take either THA 101 Introduction to Theatre or THA 101H Introduction to Theatre Honors. Duplicate credit will not be awarded.
