From its humble beginnings in a classroom at Antelope Valley Joint Union High School in 1929 with an enrollment of 20 students, Antelope Valley College has grown to a campus of 135 acres; has a large academic center in Palmdale; aeronautic programs at Fox Field; an early college program in partnership with the high school district at SOAR High School located on the main campus; services and classes at Rosamond High School; and classes for incarcerated students. Our annual unduplicated enrollment is greater than 18,000 students. As we celebrate our 91st anniversary, over the breadth of its history, the college has gained a national reputation for its service to the community and industry. Today, the college offers transfer degree programs, associate degree and certificate programs, training opportunities for career enhancement, basic skills instruction and lifelong learning opportunities.

The contemporary curriculum offerings of the college prepare students for transfer to prestigious four-year colleges and universities in the University of California system, the California State University system, and outstanding private institutions such as the University of Southern California, Brigham Young University, universities in the Ivy League, and Stanford University. For example, the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) accepts large numbers of the Antelope Valley College Honors Program students enrolled in the Transfer Alliance Program (TAP). Additionally we have articulated transfer engineering programs with CSU, Long Beach located in Lancaster and on the main campus, and strong articulated transfer programs with CSU, Bakersfield located directly on the main campus.

The college was selected as one of just 15 of the 114 community colleges in the state to begin offering a baccalaureate degree. Our program, Airframe Manufacturing Technology, began accepting students in the fall of 2016, and conferred the baccalaureate degree to its first class at commencement 2019. Additionally, the college was chosen as one of 24 in the state to offer a 2 + 2 + 3 law school articulation with six highly recognized universities and law schools, graduating our first class in 2016. Further, throughout its history, the college has maintained strong partnerships with business and industry in the Antelope Valley, developing programs of study to ensure entry into professional careers in fields such as public safety, health sciences, aviation, business, and engineering. These strong ties to local industry also ensure workplace opportunities for our graduates in the technical trades, among them, aviation, automotive, manufacturing and fabrication, electronics and welding. In meeting an immediate industry need, the college created a highly compressed, 8-week intensive certificate program leading to immediate employment in the aerospace industry.

Antelope Valley College is a very special place that prides itself on the professionalism and expertise of its administration, faculty and staff. Every employee of the college is dedicated to your success as a student at the college, and as a citizen in your community. I have every confidence you will find your time at Antelope Valley College to be well-spent and enriching.

Flexible program tracks allow students to enter as freshmen with no experience, or as juniors after completing the two-year, award-winning Aircraft Fabrication and Assembly program. Students learn state-of-the-art skills in airframe manufacturing, aircraft fabrication, and electronics by taking courses on such topics as low observables, producibility, and advanced composite manufacturing. At the same time, AVC's strong partnerships with regional employers like The Boeing Company, Lockheed Martin, Northrop Grumman and others, help students transition into exciting careers. Last year, 155 students were hired by Northrop Grumman alone!

Whether they're helping build skyscrapers or spaceships, welders perform a critical function in our high-tech, high-rise world. That's why jobs in this industry are burning more brightly than ever! According to the US Department of Labor, California has the second most welding jobs in the nation, with the greater Los Angeles area boasting one of the highest concentrations of welding jobs in the country!

At AVC, welding students get cutting-edge training in industry-standard techniques such as oxyacetylene welding (used in pipe construction and repair work), gas tungsten arc welding (used in the automotive and aerospace industries), and structural welding (used in the construction industry), which can lead to a structural welding certification from the Los Angeles Department of Building and Safety.

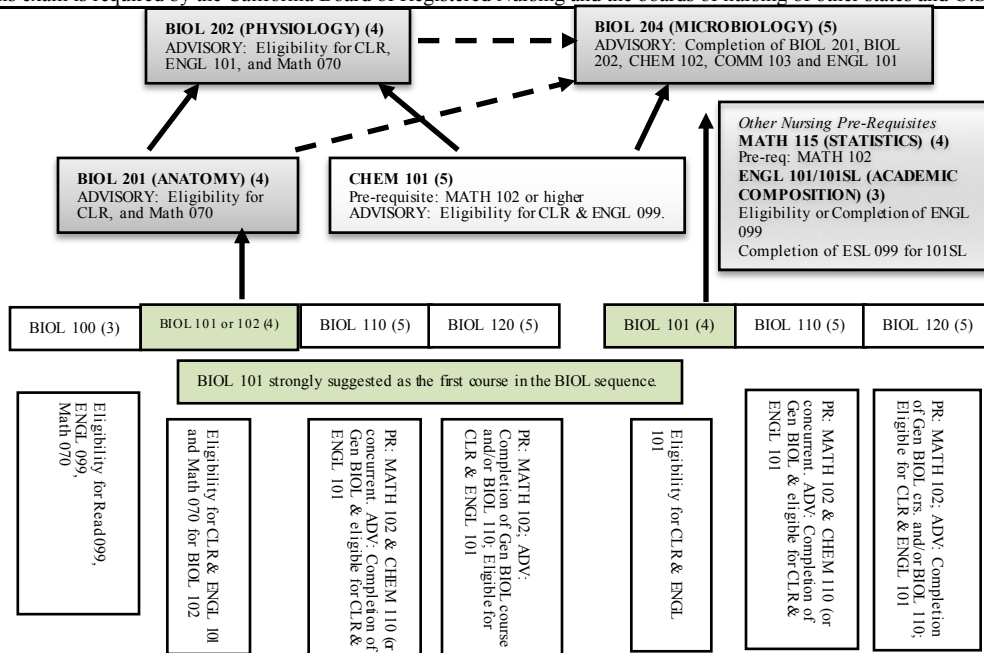

- Life experiences and special circumstance. • Proficiency or advanced coursework in languages other than English. • Results on the assessment test (Test for Essential Academic Skills, TEAS®). • Students not accepted will remain on a waiting list for the next enrollment period.

Licensure: The Associate Degree Nursing program prepares graduates and program completers for the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses. This exam is required by the California Board of Registered Nursing and the boards of nursing of other states and U.S. territories for licensure as a



Advisory: A condition of enrollment that a student is advised, but not required, to meet before or in conjunction with enrollment in a course or educational program.

Prerequisite: A condition of enrollment that a student is required to meet in order to demonstrate current readiness for enrollment in a course or educational program. Prerequisites are enforced and a student will be blocked from enrolling or involuntarily dropped after enrolling if the student does not meet the stated prerequisite. A student must complete a course prerequisite with a satisfactory grade of A, B, C or P (pass).

Corequisite: A condition of enrollment consisting of a course that a student is required to simultaneously take in order to enroll in another course. Corequisites are enforced and a student will be blocked from enrolling if the student does not meet the stated corequisite.

The "Catalog Rights Policy" sets forth the criteria used for determining the degree requirements under which students may graduate. Please refer to the AVC Catalog for a detailed description or consult with a counselor.

Electives: The remaining number of units (up to a minimum of 60) are considered electives. Any course that has already been counted toward (1) the general education requirements, or (2) the major, cannot be used as an elective. Any course with a designation of "CSU" at the end of a course description can be used as an elective for a CSU transfer and a "UC" designation for a UC school.

Grade Point Average Requirement: An overall grade point average of 2.0 ("C" average) is required.

Double Counting: While a course might satisfy more than one general education requirement, it may not be counted more than once for these purposes. A course may be used to satisfy both a general education requirement and a major or area of emphasis requirement.

Residency: Minimum of 12 units completed at AVC with a minimum of 9 of those units completed from the certificate/major. (credit earned by examination will not be included in these 12 units) Title 5, Section 54000: <http://ccr.oal.ca.gov>.

Requirements for Two or More Associate Degrees: To be eligible for multiple associate degrees, a student must have completed all of the graduation requirements for each degree.

Transfer: Students planning to continue studies at a four-year college or university after AVC should visit the Transfer Resource Center or the Counseling Center and consult with a counselor as soon as possible to develop a plan of studies. 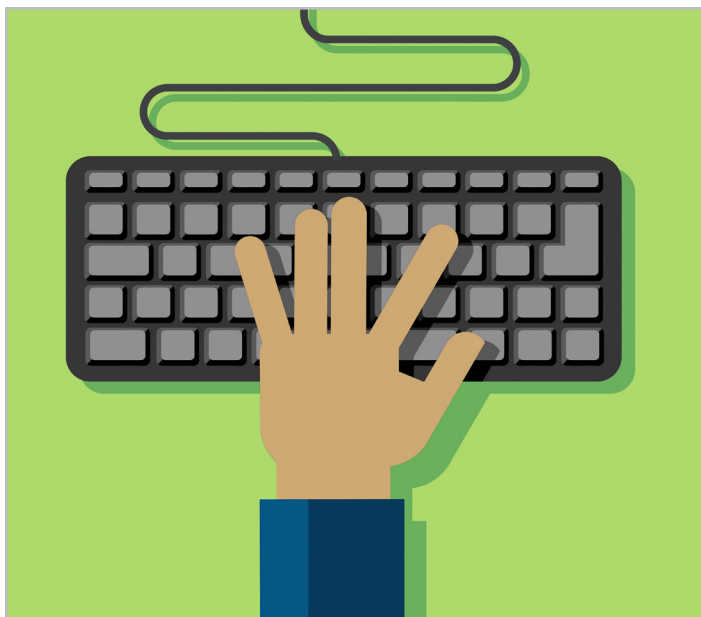

Assessment and Placement for Fall 2019 and Beyond

Know your rights to access transfer-level English and math course work!

We use your self-reported high school performance to place you into transfer-level English and math courses. Your placements may also include recommendations to access support while you are enrolled in transfer-level courses.

Research shows that your high school GPA is one of the strongest predictors of future performance in college course work.

For New, Continuing or Returning Students

If you either completed the 11th grade or graduated from a United States high school within the past 10 years, we can now use your high school performance to qualify you for transfer-level English and math courses.

English and Math Course Placement Using High School Information

If you are a new student, login to your myAVC account to complete the online orientation. Your placements will automatically occur once submitted. Refer to your application confirmation e-mail with instructions about how to access your myAVC. Follow these steps to view your course placements after completing the online orientation:

1. Login to myAVC
2. Select the "Student Success" tab
3. Review your placement options under "Matriculation"

What If You Completed Orientation But Did Not Receive Course Placements?

- You will need to see a counselor if you graduated high school more than 10 years ago, if you attended high school internationally, or have not completed the 11th grade.
- If your college application had incomplete or incorrect answers to the high school performance questions and you are still within 10 years of high school, you may complete the Guided Self-Placements for English and Math. To do this, visit: <https://www.avc.edu/student-services/assess>, scroll to the bottom of the page and complete the Guided Self-Placements online. Once completed, you will receive an e-mail confirmation message with your course placement. During regular hours of operation, you can expect us to process your results within 24 hours.

4 Once at the IRS site, enter your information **exactly** as it appears on your federal income tax return and click the "Submit" button.

6 You will know that your federal tax return information has been successfully transferred because the words "Transferred from the IRS" will display in place of the IRS information in your FAFSA® form.

10 things students need to know about Cal Grants

1. Cal Grants are free money for college, money you don't have to pay back. Cal Grants are up to \$12,630* of free money annually for up to four years of college!!!
*Amount varies depending upon the eligible school that you attend.
2. Cal Grants are good at all UCs, CSUs, community colleges and many eligible private, career and technical schools in California. Check for eligible schools at www.csac.ca.gov.
3. Submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or the California Dream Act Application (CADAA). Go to www.fafsa.gov to apply. California Dream Act students should go to www.caldreamact.org to complete a California Dream Act Application.
4. File a school verified GPA. The minimum GPA is 2.0.
5. Deadline to apply for a Cal Grant is March 2**
**When a state deadline falls on a Saturday, Sunday or holiday, applications will be accepted through the next working day.
6. Meet financial need requirements to qualify.
7. Be a California resident or AB 540 student.
8. Must graduate from a California high school or be a California resident by the age of 18. A California law gives you more time to pass the Exit Exam to receive a Cal Grant. So make sure to apply by March 2.
9. A Cal Grant is guaranteed if you meet all requirements.
10. Get help at a Cash for College workshop (October thru March 2). For a workshop near you, check out www.cash4college.org.

Any combination of two primary consecutive terms (Fall and Spring) of cumulative GPA below 2.0, and/or cumulative course completion less than 50% may result in loss of fee waiver eligibility.

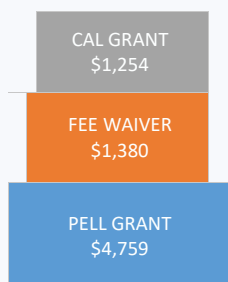

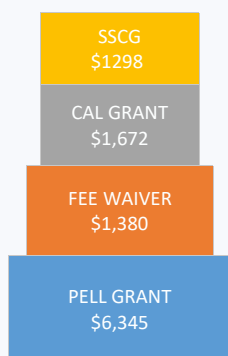

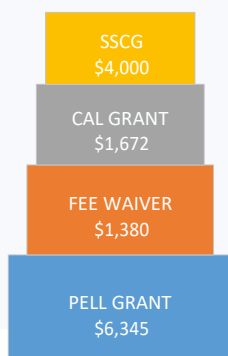

SELECTING COURSES

You are responsible for selecting courses and when to schedule your classes. It is important to consider the following when selecting courses and managing your schedule.



1. UNDERSTAND THE COLLEGE CATALOG

While meeting with a counselor is critical to your success at AVC, take the responsibility to manage your own planning and purchase a college catalog, which is at the bookstore at a low cost. The catalog is your contract with the college—it clearly spells out the requirements for degrees, certificates, majors, transfer, graduation, etc. Keep your catalog and understand it. The catalog can also be accessed online at <https://www.avc.edu/information/catalog>.

2. SELECT COURSES BASED UPON STUDENT EDUCATIONAL PLAN

Before registering for classes, use the Recommended Program Sequence Sheet for your chosen major to determine the first semester classes that you should register for. These can be found on the College website at: <https://www.avc.edu/studentservices/counseling>, or by visiting Express Counseling and speaking with a Counselor. After you are registered for classes, you can schedule a Counseling appointment to create a Student Educational Plan. Your Educational Plan is the map to your academic goal. Taking courses not on your plan will lead to extra time and money spent!

3. CHOOSE A COMFORTABLE COURSE LOAD

For each unit your class carries, expect to spend two hours of study time outside of the classroom. This is the “TWO FOR ONE” rule. For example, if you enroll in 12 units, you should expect to spend 24 hours of study out of class each week. That is a commitment of 36 hours per week. Consider employment, family commitments, and leisure time when planning your schedule. Plan carefully to allow for all scheduled activities, including study time.

4. BALANCE DIFFICULT CLASSES WITH EASIER ONES

If you are going to enroll in a class that you know will require extra time or work, select a course that would be less stressful and balance your study load.

5. SHOP AROUND FOR YOUR INSTRUCTORS

When selecting courses you may want to select faculty whose teaching style matches your learning style. Do your research and contact instructors who will be teaching the course that you are considering so that you will be well prepared for what is expected of you.

6. THINK CAREFULLY WHEN CHOOSING AN ONLINE CLASS

Many students love the flexibility of online learning, but many need face-to-face instruction. Do you have the self discipline and technical ability to succeed in an online class?

7. USE ALL THE RESOURCES YOU HAVE TO BE SUCCESSFUL

Manage your time well, create a study plan, and keep your educational plan current. Get help from your family and friends to free up time to study. See your instructor during office hours. Get a tutor and/or join a study group. Take advantage of the many resources on campus such as the Library and Learning Center.

Proficiency Requirements

Proficiency requirements exist for the areas of Writing and Math. Students must demonstrate competency in each of these areas in order to be eligible for the associate degree.

A. WRITING

Completion of ENGL 101 with a minimum grade of "C." NOTE: ENGL 101 may be taken with the Pass/No Pass option; however, students are cautioned that other colleges and universities may not accept ENGL 101 courses taken on a Pass/No Pass basis, especially for satisfaction of general education and major requirements. Students planning to transfer should check college catalogs for applicable policies.

B. MATHEMATICS

Completion of MATH 102 or higher or CIS 121 with a satisfactory grade or placement by AVC assessment into a math course higher than MATH 102.

***Fulfilling proficiencies** will not require any extra units if the competencies are demonstrated by including the required courses in the general education, or major requirements, or by satisfying the reading proficiency through AVC's policy.

Electives:

The remainder number of units (up to a minimum of 60) are considered electives. Any course that has already been counted towards (1) the general education requirements or (2) the major, cannot be used as an elective. Any course with a designation of "AVC" at the end of a course description can be used as an elective.

Grade Point Average Requirement

An overall grade point average of 2.0 ("C" average) is required.

Double Counting: While a course might satisfy more than one general education requirement, it may not be counted more than once for these purposes. A course may be used to satisfy both a general education requirement and a major or area of emphasis requirement.

• Residency: Minimum of 12 units completed at AVC with a minimum of 9 of those units completed from the certificate/major. (credit earned by examination will not be included in these 12 units) Title 5, Section 54000: <http://ccr.oal.ca.gov>

Requirements for Two or More Associate Degrees: To be eligible for multiple associate degrees, a student must have completed all of the graduation requirements for each degree.

Transfer

Transfer: Students planning to continue studies at a four-year college or university after AVC should visit the Transfer Resource Center or the Counseling Center and consult with a counselor as soon as possible to develop a plan of studies.

The "Catalog Rights Policy" sets forth the criteria used for determining the degree requirements under which students may graduate. Please refer to the AVC Catalog for a detailed description or consult with a counselor.

Advisory: A condition of enrollment that a student is advised, but not required, to meet before or in conjunction with enrollment in a course or educational program.

Prerequisite: A condition of enrollment that a student is required to meet in order to demonstrate current readiness for enrollment in a course or educational program. Prerequisites are enforced and a student will be blocked from enrolling or involuntarily dropped after enrolling if the student does not meet the stated prerequisite. A student must complete a course prerequisite with a satisfactory grade of A, B, C or P (pass).

Corequisite: A condition of enrollment consisting of a course that a student is required to simultaneously take in order to enroll in another course. Corequisites are enforced and a student will be blocked from enrolling if the student does not meet the stated corequisite.

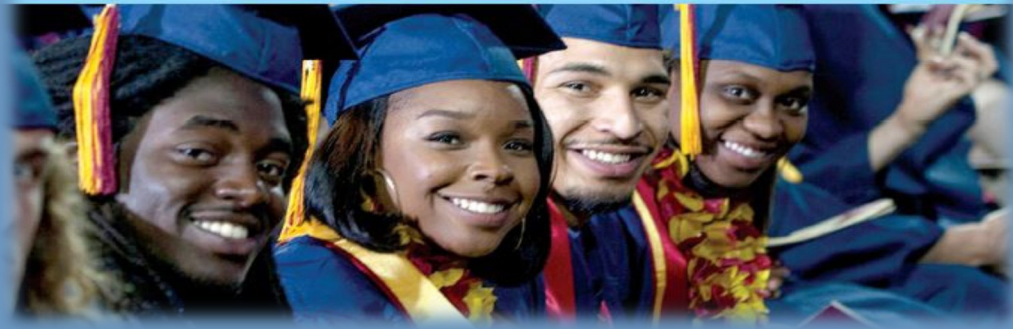

The Honors Transfer Alliance Program (TAP) offers the opportunity for priority admission to many major universities throughout the state. A seminar-like atmosphere stems from the small class size (maximum of 21), leading to lively discussions between students and professors.

Students are encouraged to work closely with faculty to pursue creative and/or independent projects. The program also stresses writing, research and critical thinking skills. The course offerings are designed to facilitate transfer to a four-year university and we offer the services of Honors Counselors (General Counseling) to assist students in planning their courses.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q. Am I guaranteed a seat in the courses for my selected pathway?

A. Yes. The benefit of participating in the AVC2CSU program is that the seats are reserved for you and the courses you need to successfully complete your transferable degree in two years.

Q. What is the difference between the transferable associate degree under AVC2CSU and the transferable degree not associated with AVC2CSU?

A. There is no difference in the transferable degree.

Q. What benefits will I receive as a participant in the AVC2CSU Program?

A. As a participant in the AVC2CSU Guided Pathway Program, you will:

- Receive priority registration with the privilege of having all of your courses mapped out and reserved for you during the two years it will take to successfully complete your transferable associate degree.
 - Experience and enjoy the continuity of a dedicated Education Advisor and a Single Point of Contact Counselor who will work with you throughout your two-year educational journey at AVC.
 - Take comfort in an intervention based safety-net system designed to recalculate your pathway (much like a GPS system) to help keep you on track to graduate in two years should you fail a course or struggle in understanding course materials and require tutorial assistance.
 - Enjoy the flexibility of individual and pathway based tutoring workshops and sessions designed to complement pathway courses.
 - Receive assistance with the California State University (CSU) application process.
 - Have direct access to the AVC2CSU Guided Pathway Program Leader for mentorship, guidance and assistance.
 - Participate in end of year AVC2CSU celebratory events put on by yourself and other students within the pathway
 - Receive special recognition at graduation.

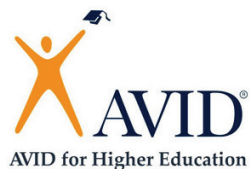

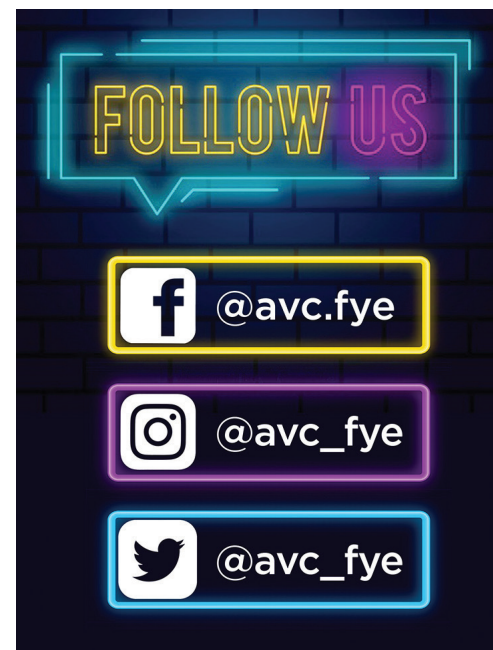

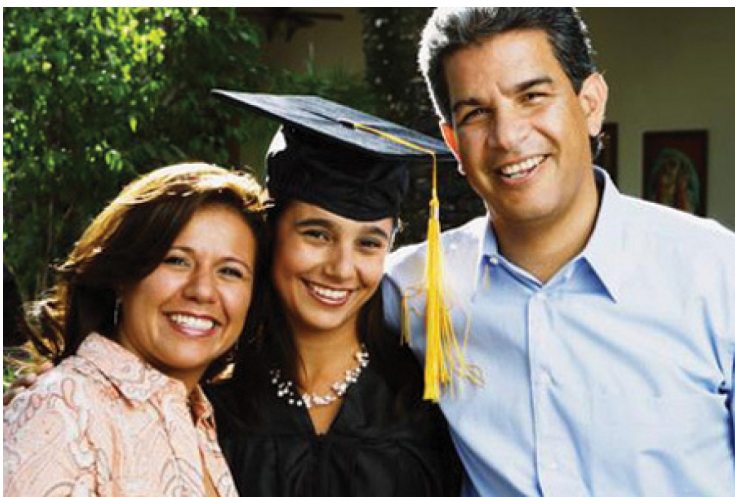

A Student Support Services Program for Academic Success

WHAT IS THE S.T.A.R. PROGRAM?

S.T.A.R. (Student Transition Academic Retention) is a federally funded TRiO Student Support Services Program.

The program is designed to identify promising students and provide instructional support services above and beyond what is currently being offered. S.T.A.R. program staff are available to work on an individual basis with student participants to provide academic and personal support.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE FOR S.T.A.R.?

- You have a documented financial need
- You have a documented disability
- You have an academic need

In addition, to be eligible you must be a U.S. citizen or a permanent resident.

The S.T.A.R. program is funded to serve 160 students annually, who are obtaining a certificate, associate degree, and/or transferring to a four-year institution.

HOW DO I APPLY FOR S.T.A.R.?

Students interested in applying for the S.T.A.R. program must complete a program application available at the S.T.A.R. office located in the Student Services Building, SSV Room 208 or online at www.avc.edu/studentservices/star.

Our Philosophy: The Office for Students with Disabilities encourages students to be as independent and self-reliant as possible. We work closely with each student to identify their individual needs and will only provide those support services and accommodations that directly address a student's functional limitations as a result of their disability.

How to Qualify: OSD serves students with physical, emotional and/or, cognitive disabilities who have an educational limitation resulting from their disability need to provide verification of their disability. The verification needs to be signed by a licensed professional; e.g. medical doctor, licensed social worker, therapist, nurse, etc. We also accept copies of Individualized Education Plans (IEPs) or 504 documentation. Participation is voluntary and all information is kept confidential.

Support Services and Accommodations: Support Services are based on the functional limitations resulting from the student's disability. Support services include: Sign language interpreters, real-time captioning, readers, scribes, audio recording of lectures, text books in alternative formats, Kurzweil 3000, test accommodations, accessible seating, peer note share, priority registration, accessible classroom furniture and use of the High-Tech Center. Other support services may be available if deemed appropriate, please contact OSD for more information.

Student Responsibilities: It is the student's responsibility to provide the OSD Office with written verification of their disability and the resulting educational functional limitations. The student is responsible for making their individual needs known to their instructors, as soon as possible, thereby making it possible to work out any accommodations that might be necessary. If the student experiences any difficulty in their classes, they need to notify OSD staff as soon as possible so that we have the opportunity to work with the student to resolve the issue.

Applying for Services:

- Students must first be a registered AVC student; If you have not yet applied to AVC, apply on-line at www.avc.edu
- Once students are accepted to AVC and are provided a student ID number and AVC email address, they can then apply for OSD services by:
 - Completing the on-line OSD application: <https://teton.accessiblelearning.com/avc>
 - Providing verification of disability (uploaded to the application)
 - Signed by a licensed practitioner, clinician or rehabilitation counselor
 - (Also accepted are Individual Education Plan (IEP) or 504 Plan)
- Once the completed application is reviewed, the student will be contacted to schedule an intake appointment with an OSD counselor to discuss limitations, choose accommodations, and to develop an Education and Academic Accommodation Plan.

Building a Sense of Community Using Porch Talks

Through out history the "Porch" has been used as a place where families and neighbors came together to share what was happening in the community, pass down traditions, tell stories, and just be together as people and build a community through those interactions.

As the daughter of an underground hip-hop legend who died right before he hit big, Bri's got massive shoes to fill. But it's hard to get your come up when you're labeled a hoodlum at school, and your fridge at home is empty after your mom loses her job. So Bri pours her anger and frustration into her first song, which goes viral...for all the wrong reasons.

Bri soon finds herself at the center of a controversy,

portrayed by the media as more menace than MC. But with an eviction notice staring her family down, Bri doesn't just want to make it—she has to. Even if it means becoming the very thing the public has made her out to be.
