
AVC Writing Center Handout Writing a Research Paper

Writing a research paper involves the following:

- · Actively read the writing assignment by circling purpose words and highlighting important content information; consider your audience.
- . Choose a topic and use pre-writing strategies (clustering, freewriting, brainstorming, etc.) to discover what you already know about the topic.
- Conduct pre-research to find out what is being said or written about the topic; narrow or broaden your topic if needed; consult a librarian.
- · Decide on a focus for your thesis statement; make an assertion or claim about your topic; become familiar with the format/style required.
- · Conduct more research to find evidence that supports your thesis statement; make an outline of points you want to make.
- Draft your paper; introduce the topic; create topic sentences for body paragraphs; consider how to integrate evidence and your own analysis.
- Cite sources within the paper; use signal phrases and parenthetical citations; cross-reference to citations on the works cited or references page.
- Revise global concerns in the paper (thesis statement, paragraphs, logical order of ideas, etc.); check for plagiarism and make adjustments.
- Edit for grammar and punctuation; proofread before submitting the paper by reviewing spelling and possible typographical errors.

Research Checklist

Getting Organized My D	Due Dates
Actively read the writing assignment; consider purpose and audience. Set a realistic timetable using this checklist or some other method.	
Choosing a topic	E 3.41 20
Find and choose an appropriate topic. Pre-write and conduct pre-research. Reconsider or modify your topic if necessary (consult a reference librarian).	
Writing a Thesis Statement	
Turn your topic into a guiding question you want to answer. Write a thesis statement that answers your guiding question; make a claim. Make an informal outline of points you are considering to support your thesis.	
Starting Research	
Gather your sources; create a "working" bibliography list of sources. Take notes as you read; look for examples, opinions, facts, statistics, etc.) Consult a writing handbook on citing sources properly and avoiding plagiarism. Write a more formal outline if required.	
Start Writing the First Draft	
Write a strong introduction. Integrate evidence and your own analysis throughout your paragraphs. Write a conclusion that refers back to your thesis statement.	
Revise, Edit, and Proofread	
Re-read your paper and decide if it needs changing or re-organizing. Ensure that sources are cited properly. Re-write the paper in final form. Complete a Works Cited (MLA) or References page (APA). Check for errors: grammar, punctuation, spelling, and capitalization.
